Dear Sir:-The people of this section are complaining bitterly of the train Chatham for space donated in their

The train commonly known as the "Whooper" that for years ran daily, bringing passengers into \$51. 30. Newcastle in the forenoon: giving them time for banking; shopping and other business before returning in the evening, and making good railway connections; now runs only three days a week, reaching Newcastle at 2:40 p.m.; too late for banking and all trains going south-east that day, and giving too little time for shopping and other business befrue returning at 5:30 p.m.

Regarding the service from this locality, to and from St. John yia Fredericton; your connections are so bad that one leaving Sti. John on an afternoon train. must main over night at Fredericton on some days, and all of the day as well, on other days.

Your train leaves St. John at 4:20 p.m. and arrives at Fredericminutes after the departure your train for Newcastle.

Until recently the C. P. R. afterno train from St. John reached Fredericton in time to connect with your train for Newcastle but nov your train leaves at. the same time that the other train arrives at the C.P.R. station, thus setting that convenience

Formerly one could leave here in the morning and reach St. John via Fredericton, early in the afternoon of the same day

Also leave St. John in the afternoon and arrive there, via Frederic ton at about 11:30 the same night.

These and many other that might be mentioned, give the impression of lack of consideration for the convenience of the traveling public, so at the request of many people of this locality, and because I feel these inconvenience very much myself. I draw your attention to the matter trust that you will give it consideration and find a way improving our railway service.

The above are some of the reasons why automobiles are uesd much more, and trains correspondingly less than formerly.
