## MAY ERECT NEW ARENA AT GALT

Amateur Association is Organized With That End in View.

Galt, April 2.—With the organization of the Galt Amateur Athletic Association Galt will return to the sporting may. The meeting was the most enthusiastic ever held in this city to promote sports, the City Council chamber being packed with citizens of all classes and men interested and participants in various lines of sport.

The greatest of enthusiasm prevailed, and it was announced that A. R. Goldie would donate a silver cup for the soccer league and R. H. Chapple a cup for the baseball league.

The question of securing a grand stand for Dickson Park was discussed, and also that of the erection of an arena with an artificial ice plant. A committee composed of Messrs. A. R. Goldie, J. C. Turnbull, A. E. Willard, J. A. Head and J. A. Fraser was appointed to look up locations for an arena and report back.

**OTTAWA FOR N.L.U.**

Players to Play Again Without Remuneration

Ottawa, April 2.—There will be senior lacrosse in Ottawa during the coming summer if those who constituted the Ottawa team last summer agree to turn out and play without remuneration. This was the announcement made Monday night following a brief conference at the Russell House of the executive committee of the Ottawa Club. The exact situation at the present time is as follows: The National Lacrosse Union has prepared to reorganize and will likely consist of the following clubs: Nationals, Shamrocks, Cornwall, Montreal A. A. A., and Ottawa. Mr. Eddie St. Perce, General Manager of the National A.A.A. has written to the Ottawa Club extending an invitation to co-operate with the Nationals in the re-organization of the N. L. U. It is proposed to schedule a single series of home and home games, and to have the winners play off with the Western Ontario League finalists to decide which should challenge for the Minio Cup.

Elections in Chicago Show Return of William Hale Thompson and Large Majority Against Dry Legislation

Chicago, April 2.—Complete returns today from yesterday's municipal election showed that William Hale Thompson (Republican) was re-elected mayor for a term of four years by plurality of 17,900 over Robert S. Weicker (Democrat), his nearest competitor, and that the city voted "wet" by a majority of 247,228, in protest against the city going dry in July.
