He characterized the Premier's budget speech as the weakest of the twenty-six budgets he had listened to in the House. He pointed out that the Government had done nothing to advance the interests of the farmers or fishermen, the only two classes of wealth producers in the Province. An ambas sador had been sent to England; but he never would have been sent, if he had not kicked in the traces. Mr. Campbell then exposed, at length the inconsistency and hypocrisy of the Liberal party in the matter of trade, and held up to redicule their record of broken pledges. 
