Cable News.

LONDON, Aug. 3.
Decision to call a strike here of dock laborers has been postponed until Saturday. This action was agreed to last night in expectation that 20,000 more men would go out this morning. The Chamber of Commerce is making attempts to have the dispute arbitrated upon. Pending the outcome of such action, the general strike is held in abeyance. A number of ships that arrived in port since yesterday will be sent to convenient ports to have cargoes discharged. Dock laborers at continental ports have been advised not to handle the goods.

CANB, N.S., Aug. 3.
While approaching the harbor last night, in a dense fog, the steam trawler Cambria struck Flag Island Point. The mate, Sorensen, and one of the crew, Thompson, were drowned. The Cambria was one of the largest type of steam trawlers belonging to Grimsby, England, was commanded by Capt. Olsen, and has been fishing on this side the past few weeks with fair success. It is not known what may be the chances of floating the ship.

BERLIN, Aug. 3.
Marine Rundschau, an official monthly review, issued by the German navy department, publishes a despatch from Tokio, indicating that Japan will seek to compensate herself for disadvantages she suffers under revised treaty with Britain by approachment with Germany. Encouragement in this direction is seen in the circumstances that prominent Japanese are taking the initiative in re-organization of defunct society for cultivation of German and Japanese friendly social relations. Nogi Victor of Port Arthur, now visiting Berlin, is receiving distinguished attention from military leaders.

The Postmaster General is arranging with Graham White, aviator, for an experimental aeroplane postal service between London and Windsor. The King is interested in the project and has given permission to use Windsor Park as a terminus for the route. The service will start during the present month.

General Aceveda and his handful of men attempted a revolution, starting from Keda, on Monday night, and was still at liberty to-day. Reports of an uprising at Jarnco, 24 miles east of the capital, yesterday are now confirmed. The scene of operation is at Coneybees. Quiet continues in all other parts of the island.

To Fly No Union Jack on Canadian Navy.

London Globe Says Laurier's Evil Doctrine is Going to Excessive Lengths—Affected Africa.
London, July 28.—The Globe frankly regrets that Laurier did not find it convenient to reply to Lord Walmer's question, asking for a definite statement as to Canada's decision regarding participation in war. The Globe says there have been significant signs that the evil of the Laurier doctrine has corrupted some South African politicians and apparently the Commonwealth Premier. It has also been put to immediate use in Canada itself as shown in Laurier's Montreal speech that he has established a free maritime zone, both on the Atlantic and Pacific, which shall be absolutely under Canada's own care.

No Union Jack.
The Globe says it is further asserted that Canadian vessels will fly both the White Ensign and the special Canadian flag, the latter replacing the Union Jack. While the Jack is only a symbol, it is an extremely significant symbol. Its omission will be regarded by many with feelings we hardly care to give utterance to. It is pushing the doctrine of autonomy to excessive lengths. We know from Laurier's speech that he prides himself on this.

Some Fish Fares.

From passengers who arrived by Friday's express we learn that Mr. Gabriel Billard, formerly of St. George's, was the hero in a sad occurrence which took place at Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, on Tuesday last. Charles and Jos. Burke, fishermen, were in Gooseberry Cove when a sudden squall came up and capsized their boat. They were both thrown into the water and notwithstanding his brother's efforts Charles quickly succumbed and drowned. Joseph clung to the boat when he was seen from the shore by Billard, who quickly swam to the rescue, bringing in Burke safely.—Western Star.

An Attempt to Wreck the Train.
