



Eggs By The Million.

Four thousand new-laid egs an our! That is the quanity needed for invalid soldiers in the hospitals at home and in France, and to supply this demand has been the task of the National Egg Collection for the wounded, one of the most useful and energetic war organizations which has yet been founded. "I cannot think." says Queen Alexandra, who

has become a patron of the organization, "of any more valued boon to our sick and wounded in hospital than a

supplies for the hospitals at Malta and Egypt, to meet the needs of the wounded from the Dardanelles, and it is absolutely essential that the regular weekly supply should not fall pelow 750,000."

Little Luxuries for Our Men. Altogether, 7,000,000 eggs have been collected and dispatched, as required, since the movement started, and at the present moment over 5,000 people are engaged throughout the country collecting eggs for the wounded. Tiny children have come forward with their contributions, as well as the poultry farmer with his huge consignments. Depots have been established all over the country, the central depot being in London, at Messrs. Harrods, Ltd., Trevor Square, Knightsbridge, S. W., to which eggs may be sent direct, or they may be dispatched to the nearest collecting lepots, a full list of which can be had on application to the National Egg Collection, 154 Fleet Street, E.C. There are no expenses, egg boxes beng sent free to applicants and all

One of the most energetic workers n connection with this movement is Lady Monson, who told the writer how, in one case, a woman whose husband and son have both enlisted has promised four eggs a week regularly until the end of the war. "Every single egg is welcome," says her ladyship, "for it means a little luxury for guarding our homes and our country the men who suffer through safefrom the German hordes."


