



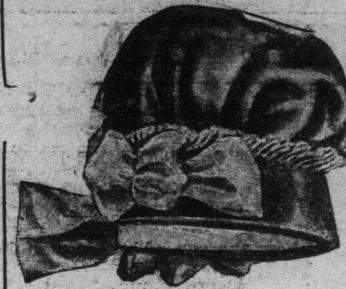

I do not think most people realize to what an extent crossness is a habit.

It is so easy to be cross over all sorts of little things if one gets one's mind turned that way.

And it is so easy, too, as easy, I don't claim that, good habits seldom are as easy to acquire as bad ones.

It is a matter of course in some families to be cross at annoyances.

In a family where the habit of crossness prevails the housemates look upon it as a matter of course that they shall be cross when anyone does not understand, or when anyone makes some small mistake, or whenever any little annoyance of one kind or another comes up, or when they themselves are tired.

"Mercy, no," snaps the daughter of the house. "How could you think I meant Mrs. Richard Smith? You know she hasn't any children old enough to skate. How could she be out skating with them? If you'd only think, mother, you'd know I meant Mrs. Philip Smith."

The maid forgets to give the son's laundry to the laundryman, and when he finds himself short of collars he immediately seizes the opportunity to let off all the pent-up irritation of the day's small annoyances in one uncontrolled spasm of crossness, because "I never can find any clean collars."

"You know I always come to the back door."

One of the housemates knocks at the back door, and another, who is not quick at realizing where sound comes from, goes first to the front door. When, a minute later, he reaches the back door, he is met by an outburst of impatient crossness: "Can't you tell where a sound comes from? I've been waiting here about five minutes, and you know I always come to the back door." (He omits to remember that, not being gifted with second sight, the person within could scarcely know that it was he, and therefore could not be assisted in knowing which door it was by a knowledge of his habits.)

"A Mr. Benham called you up on the phone," says the housemother to the housefather. He smiles a smug, satisfied, superior smile which in its half-furrow, is as cutting as any outburst of crossness, and says, "I suppose you mean Grenham."

What Does Anyone Gain By Being Cross?

No one gains anything by this habit of being cross. And the ill effect on the atmosphere of the home is incalculable.

I was in a greenhouse talking to a florist the other day. His carnations were drooping. "We've had several days of cloudy weather," he said, "and they miss the sun. Nothing I can do for them will keep them up when the sun is away too long."

A home in which the housemates have the habit of being cross is a home where there is too little heart sunshine. What wonder that the human flowers within droop and fade? Just make up your mind to be pleasant. It really isn't so hard when you get your mind set that way. It may be hard to start, especially if you have freely permitted yourself the
