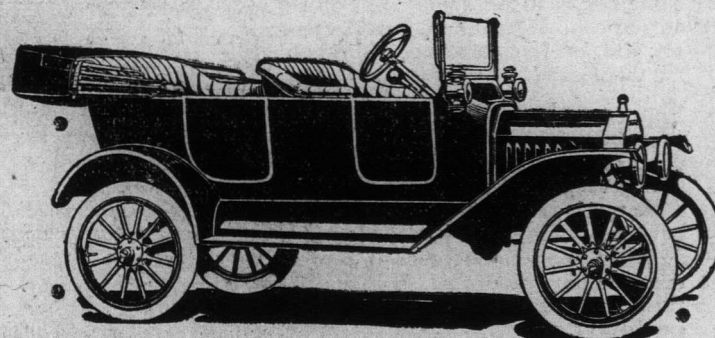

New Super Zeppelin.

Seven Hundred and Fifty Feet Long, with Seven Motors, with Machine Guns and Small Cannon, Reported Making Trial Flights Over a Swiss Town.

Zurich, Switzerland, May 30, via Paris, May 31.—Reports have reached Zurich from Romanshorn, a Swiss town on Lake Constance, that a new super-Zeppelin, 750 feet long, has been seen when making trial flights over the lake. The total capacity of the airship is 54,000 cubic metres, or about double that of Zeppelins of the earlier type. The new craft is fitted with seven motors, four armoured gondolas, machine guns, small cannon and apparatus for dropping bombs and discharging aerial tor-

pedoes. It weighs forty tons, is able to rise 15,000 feet, and has a long range of action.

School Luncheons.

Those Wholesome Menus Will Be Helpful to Busy Mothers.

Two lettuce sandwiches, two brown bread and cream cheese, two margarine, two ripe olives, an orange.

Two chicken sandwiches, two of chopped figs, a handful of peanuts, a slice of cake, a ripe banana.

Two brown bread and egg sandwiches, two of white bread and orange marmalade, a chicken drumstick, a square of fruit water, an orange.

Two sandwiches of dates and white bread, a slice of lamb, two ginger-snaps, some molasses candy.

Two sandwiches of whole wheat bread, stewed prunes and chopped nuts, two chocolate wafers, two olives.

Two sandwiches of cream cheese and lettuce, two of preserved ginger, a piece of sponge cake, an orange.

Nut and Raisin Sandwiches.—Mix equal parts chopped nuts and raisins, spread between thin slices of buttered bread cut in fancy shapes.

Two sandwiches of dates and nuts, a small spice cake, a jar of orange salad, an apple.

Two roast beef sandwiches, two of cream cheese and chopped peanuts, two small celery stalks, two sugar cookies.

Two minced ham sandwiches, two of chopped celery, two or three olives, four pulled figs.

Two celery sandwiches, two of chopped chicken and olives, three stuffed prunes, a slice of dark cake, an orange.

Cheese and Olive Sandwiches.—Split a kind of good, wholesome cracker in halves. Spread with a layer of cream cheese, then a layer of chopped ripe olives. Press together and serve.

Pecan Nut Sandwiches.—Spread creamed butter on thin slices of graham bread. Push into the side of a buttered piece rows of pieces of halves of pecan meats.

Egg and Olive Sandwiches.—Spread chopped beef, chicken or cheese between buttered slices of thin bread, cover with a layer of finely chopped olives, cut into one-half inch wide slices. Nice is served on crisp lettuce leaves.

A glass of pure milk or a cup of hot cocoa may be served with these luncheons in small patent bottles.

War News

KITCHENER'S STAFF.

LONDON, June 6.—Accompanying Earl Kitchener his staff were Hugh James O'Connell, former Councillor to the British Embassy at Petrograd, and former Minister at Sofia, O. A. Fitzgerald. Kitchener's private military secretary, Brigadier General Ellershaw and Frederick Donaldson.

WAR COUNCIL MEETS.

LONDON, June 6.—When the news of the sinking of the Hampshire was received in London, a meeting of the British War Council was immediately called. Wm. Robertson, Chief of the Imperial Staff, who probably will become head of the War Office, Sir John Grey, Reginald McKenna, and Lloyd George were present.

BEATTY AND THE NORTH BATTLE.

LONDON, June 6.—Rear-Admiral Sir Beatty, who was elected to the seat of Lord Commons left vacant by Admiral Charles Beresford, when the was created Baron, and who has come spokesman for the Navy, in a public meeting to-day the following letter from Vice-Admiral Sir Beatty, who commanded the cruiser squadron in the North Sea: "We drew the enemy into the jaws of our fleet. I have no regret except for the gallant lives lost. It would have warmed your hearts to have seen how gallant they were. I brought his squadron into the North Sea. Would to God we had been more successful in the general result. We are ready for them next time. Please God it will come soon. The battle cruiser fleet is still alive. It has a very big kick in her."

BATTLE RAGING ON RUSSIAN FRONT.

AMSTERDAM, June 6.—Despatches from Vienna state that a violent battle has been raging during the past 24 hours on the Russian front, along a sweep of 300 metres (about 200 miles.) The respondents describe countless of Russian infantry being sent to battle. General Brussiloff, who believed to be in command of Russian forces on this front, according to advices, to be following tactics pursued by the Russians the Carpathians, making mass attacks in an effort to break through the title lines.

REPORTED CAPTURE OF PRISONERS BY RUSSIANS.

PETROGRAD, June 6.—The Russians continue to declare the success won by their offensive. It is reported that up to the present time they captured 280 officers, 25,000 men, cannon and 15 machine guns.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT OF NORTHERN SEA BATTLE.

LONDON, June 6.—The following official statement regarding the North Sea battle was issued here to-day: The German Navy Ministry official issued on June 6 that among other casualties a submarine was sunk in the course of the battle during the afternoon of 31st May. All British ships on the sea at that date have returned, and it must therefore be assumed if any importance can be attached to the German official statement, that an enemy submarine vessel should be added to the German losses stated in the official of June 4.

EARL KITCHENER.

LONDON, June 6.—Incidents and phases in Kitchener's career are being minutely recalled now in connection with the untimely end. There is no doubt that his life was a very busy one.

Kitchener of Khartoum

The saddest news of the whole war so far, as the general public is concerned was the tidings yesterday of the death of Lord Kitchener while on his way to Russia. It is a great blow to the Empire. The loss of no other man could have caused such a sensation throughout the Empire. The fact, however, is lightened by the loss that his main task at the War Office has been accomplished. He has created an army of five or six million men, organized as a fighting force, equipped them with staffs of all kinds, staffs for the Expeditionary forces, for army corps, division and brigades. He has organized transport services, medical units and all the machinery to keep a force active on the field of battle. More than this he has trained men fitted to succeed him in the various duties he undertook. From the time of his first fame in the Sudan, the Kitchener young men, as they were called in the days of the Boer war have been the head and front of the army, and have been the forefront of the higher commands in the Expeditionary force in France. It cannot then be said that his life's work is left unperformed. What he has begun so well other capable hands can finish. His has been a busy life, and

that life has been devoted to answering call of duty. It was only a keen sense of duty that called him to the War Office and to vacate his position in Egypt to which his heart was given. In his walks of life no man has rendered greater service to his King and countrymen than Horatio Kitchener, and the King's order to his soldiers throughout the Empire to wear official mourning is but a fitting tribute to his memory. No doubt throughout the Empire Memorial Services will be held as tributes to the life services of the most distinguished son of the Empire. He died a soldier's death at the post of duty, and though his grave is in the deep it is a fitting one for a soldier of the Sea King.

Mr. Hickman's Vindication.

After suffering from the cruel tongue of slander for many months, his fellow countrymen last night honourably acquitted of complicity in the conspiracy, with which he was charged, and never before in this community has the accused stepped from the dock amidst such popular expressions of sympathy and satisfaction as was spontaneously accorded to Mr. Hickman last night. The crowds in the Court House itself could barely restrain themselves when the Court discharged him. They literally tried to haul him from the dock. The Court officials properly called on citizens to restrain themselves and conduct themselves in accordance with the dignity and decorum of the King's Court room and in the presence of the King's Judge. It was the bursting of pent-up feeling that there could only be one verdict and the satisfaction felt by all that a jury had given the only possible verdict. The crowd awaited for quite a time in front of the Court House and when Mr. Hickman appeared he was cheered to the echo by some two thousand persons who were awaiting him. Not only has Mr. Hickman been vindicated by the jury who spent two days listening to the evidence and addresses, but he has the satisfaction of receiving a vindication at the hands of some thousands of his fellow townsmen, such as no other person who has been tried on a criminal charge has received. Last night we were told by an old citizen of prominence in the city that he had never seen the like of his experience. The only tribute of the kind occurred many years ago after

a verdict on a libel suit in which the Proprietor of the Evening Telegram was involved. A similar demonstration occurred then. The crowds then followed Mr. Herder to the office and had to be begged to leave the office until an issue was published detailing the trial and verdict, and when it was printed the boys had to be put out through the back window as the front door was blocked by the crowd, who only dispersed when they had obtained copies of the issue.
