Three Meetings Last Night.


TORBAY ROAD, MAJOR'S PATH AND PORTUGAL COVE. FOR THE FIGHTING THIO, HIGGINS, VIN-ICOMBE AND FOX.

In pursyance of the programme outined for this week's campaign, the Fighting Trio, Higgins, Vinicomba and Fox, last night visited and held bumper meetings at Torbay Road, Major's Path and the Kenny's Pond section of the Portugal Cove Road. Despite the boisterous weather, the hree meetings were exceedingly well attended practically every voter in the different localities being present. This was particularly noticeable in the case of the Major's Path meeting, which was the direct opposite of the fiasco conducted there by the "Reform" candidates last Friday night. 




