Forty-Three Years in the Public
Service—The Evening TelegramSaved Life of
Injured Shipmate.

Heroic efforts by his shipmates who sewed up seventeen wounds in his abdomen with sail twine and heavy needles, and then wrapped the body with adhesive tape, saved the life of Boyd O'Neil, and engineer on board the S. S. New England, while at sea on April 20, according to a report made by Capt. William Rind, of the U. S. Line, S. S. America. The Captain's own services in promptly answering the radio distress call of the New England, his taking aboard the injured man and providing adequate surgical aid, also figured largely. The transfer was accomplished in a sea stretcher. He was carried to Bremen and placed in a hospital there. To give assistance, the America made a detour of 180 miles. O'Neil, who is a veteran of the United States Navy, was injured while making repairs in the engine room, through the bursting of a steam pipe. Prompt aid through the rough surgery of his shipmates saved O'Neil's life, according to the American doctors.

Shop-Window Dressing.

An experiment to ascertain the best mode of shop window display was recently made in Germany. The shop chosen for the test was one which catered especially to women. It had 15 windows for the display of its goods, and these were arranged in different ways. In one window the articles all bore price labels, in another they were not priced; in some windows one color alone was used, in others there were a variety of shades; some windows were severely practical, containing nothing but the goods for sale; others were dressed with picturesque settings and accessories. A means was devised of checking the number of actual purchases that each window or each different scheme attracted. Some of the results were unexpected. The sales of articles bearing price labels greatly exceeded those of unmarked articles. Windows with varied colored articles were more popular than those in which one color only was shown, and usually, but not always, a large variety of articles drew better than a few. The result least expected was that the elaborately dressed window, with decorative accessories proved a much less effective salesman than the undecorated window.

Observe This Rule.

A new ruling came into effect on April 1, allowing a wave length all over Canada of 180 metres for spark transmission and 200 for C.W. transmission. Due to the fact that considerable interferences with commercial stations has been taking place, the department at Ottawa requires that these new regulations be strictly enforced. This means that any amateur station interfering with commercial broadcasting on wave lengths higher than that allowed to their stations will be rigidly prosecuted.

Steamers Bound
to Botwood.

THREE SHIPS HARBOUR HEAD.

Yesterday S.S. Alouada, Capt. Turnbull, arrived in port from North Sydney with a load of coal for the A.N. D. Co. at Botwood. The Norwegian steamer Halse, 14 days from Liverpool, in ballast, for the same port, also arrived here during the forenoon. At nine o'clock last night the S.S. Cranley steamed up port with a general cargo on board. The three ships are bound to Botwood, but owing to that port being closed to navigation owing to an ice blockade, they were compelled to put in here. When the S.S. Halse arrived in port the Chief Officer was removed to General Hospital suffering from an injured ankle.
