IS SHIPPED TO FRANCE.

"Houses of painted wood? How
strange!" or "No servants? How do
you manage?" These are typical re-
marks of Frenchwomen when Ameri-
can women tell them something of
their homes in the United States.

Soon they will have a chance to see
just what a modern American house
looks like.

A 10-room house, considered rep-
resentative of the "typical" American
home, was erected recently in Brook-
lyn, N.Y. Then it was dismantled
completely and placed on a ship with
its furnishings and equipment to be
taken to France for exhibition in
February at the American Section of
the International Exhibition of House-
hold Appliances and Labor-Saving
Devices.

The two-story shingle house main-
tains the Colonial atmosphere
throughout. The furnishings and de-
corations are all authentic copies
from period pieces. Comfort and liv-
ableness in the interior are empha-
sized. The house is equipped with
running hot and cold water, electric
lights, gas service, and has every de-
vice that modern inventive ingenu-
ity has provided to chase drudgery
from the home.

When they all see the rebuilt home,
Frenchwomen will be astonished by
the amount of housework that can be
done by pressing a button. For
vacuum cleaners, washing machines,
drying machines, electric irons, cook-
ers and refrigerators are unknown to
most Frenchwomen.

After the International Exhibition
is closed the American Home is to
be given to the French cities who
has made the greatest contribution to
humanity in recent years.

New Giant Bomber

Capt. S. Wilcockson, R.A., Imperial
Airways pilot, has been carrying out
flying tests during the past few days
from the Cricklewood Aerodrome, N.
W., with a huge new Handley Page
aeroplane, driven by Napier engines
developing just on 1,000-h.p., which
has been designed for the Air Ministry
as a high-speed night bomber.

Despite its size, the giant craft is
capable of rushing through the air at
more than 100 miles an hour, and even
when heavily laden it will climb rap-
idly to a high altitude and fly long dis-
tances without needing to refuel.

Externally the new machine, of
which a number are now in construc-
tion, is treated with a peculiar tint of
green dope which, experiments have
shown, is likely to render it least
visible when in flight at night.

An Eerie Mountain

PROFESSOR'S FLIGHT FROM "BIG
GREY MAN."

Dr. J. Norman Collie, professor of
applied chemistry at University Col-
lege, Gower Street, W.C., speaking at
Aberdeen recently, said that he had
had many adventures when mountain
climbing, but he experienced the most
terrible fear of his lifetime when, 35
years ago, he was climbing Ben Mac-
dubh, Aberdeenshire, which is 4,296
feet high and the second highest
mountain in Great Britain. He was
turning from the summit in a mist
when he heard sounds as of footsteps
behind him.

He listened and heard the noise
again, but could see nothing. As he
walked on and the eerie "crunch,
crunch" sounded behind him he was
seized with the most tremendous ter-
ror. He took to his heels and ran
staggering blindly among the bould-
ers for four or five miles. On no ac-
count would he ever venture to the top
of Ben Macdubh alone.

He had since learned that another
climber once saw a man who looked
to be almost 10 feet high wandering
round the top of the mountain at mid-
night.

A man who lived on the slope of the
mountain, when told the stories, re-
plied that "it would have been the big
grey man they had seen."
