A New Chicago Sensation.

For lour years past a party of spiritu-alists in Chicago have been differently boring a hole in the earth, on the western side of the city; in quest of oil. A "me djum" led by an invisible spirit, promised that by the exercise of much faith and a sian well, but no oil. A few days ago, however, a phenomenon actually occurred. The Chicago Tholome tells the story thus:—Is seems that, not satisfied with their previous experiments, and the rich flow which has followed their explorations, they have been boring still deeper.
