THAUMATURGIC JOAN OF ARC!

French Heroine Cures Cancer, Consumption and Other Human Ills

Rome, May 7.—The Congregation of Rites met recently to consider three new miracles attributed by Roman Catholics to Joan of Arc since her beatification by the Pope in 1909.

In the decree of beatification three miracles were cited. The first concerned a nun, who, "having suffered for three years from a cancer in the stomach, was on the point of death, but on imploring Joan of Arc, was instantly cured." The second concerned a nun who suffered from tuberculosis and ulcers in the legs, and praying to Joan of Arc, was cured the same day. The last concerns a nun, who, "after suffering from cancer for ten years, was cured after praying for five days."

Trees for Planting.

For the benefit of those wishing to celebrate Arbor Day in appropriate manner, Parks Superintendent Reader announces that he will have a limited number of Russian poplars for disposal on the afternoon of Thursday and morning of Friday, May 8 and 9, at the parks superintendent's office, Union cemetery. Prices range from 30 cents to 50 cents each, and no person will be allowed to purchase more than six trees.

WOMEN WANT MARKET

Victoria Park Suggested as Temporary Building

The following petitions were discussed at the meeting of the executive committee of the home economic committee, which met on Tuesday afternoon in the "Y" parlors.

First—To petition the C.P.R. that a wholesale market be established near the tracks where cars conveying produce may be side-tracked and where the retailers may go for their goods.

Second—That the city be asked to give one of the buildings in Victoria park for the public market, where the farmers living near Calgary may come to sell their goods. This building to be used till a permanent market be built in some section of the city where it is convenient to the car lines and may be entered by a spur line from the C.P.R.

Third—That the city be asked why the wholesale market reports are not published correctly, telling the exact price, instead of a price ranging between two figures.

That the retail merchants of the city are anxiously watching the movements of this committee is apparent by the number of telephone calls received by the members from them. They protest too much that nothing can be done, but the committee are determined to see for themselves.

One of the members stated that in the district around Strathmore where garden stuffs were grown, large quantities were wasted because the city wholesalers and retailers would not buy, but preferred getting their goods from British Columbia.

Another lady present said that all winter she had been buying eggs from a rancher's wife fifteen miles from a dozen, which was more than the woman could sell them for at the stores.

Before appointing committees to handle the petitions discussed, it was decided to call another mass meeting of the housewives of Calgary. They will be addressed by a representative of the city wholesalers, by a retailer and by the president of the farmers' union of Strathmore. The meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 14, at 3 o'clock in the library hall.

The ladies also discussed Mr. Fee's statement that a cash system would mean a discount of ten per cent. to the consumer. This had been understood exactly as Mr. Fee had meant it. That a succession of cash payments to the retailer, the wholesaler, the jobber and the producer would eventually mean a discount to the consumer.

An interpretation put on Mr. Fee's remarks by the retailers was entirely wrong.

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"WORK IS ONLY FOR FOOLS AND SLAVES"

So Says Old and Experienced Brigand, Now in Chains Again

Rome, May 7.—A formidable brigand chieftain named Paparoni has been captured in remarkable circumstances near Viterbo.

Last August the man was released after serving seventeen years' penal servitude for brigandage, but a fortnight later he was busy organizing a new marauding body, who over about 100 square miles of territory levied tribute from landlords and farmers.

Paparoni's capture is due to betrayal. Before taking his customary afternoon walk, Paparoni, for prudence sake, sent out three companions to scout. Soldiers, being aware of Paparoni's desire, led the three lookouts past. When Paparoni appeared, the carabinieri pounced on him, bound him in chains from head to foot, and hurried him away between an escort of horsemen to the nearest barracks.

Asked what he had to say for himself, Paparoni boldly replied: "The kaiser of work is foolish and slavish. Heaven forbid I should prove unworthy of my early vocation."
