DISTRIBUTION OF SEED **GRAIN AND POTATOES** From the Dominion Experimental Farms, 1915-1916

By instructions of the Hon, Minster of Agriculture a free distribution of superior sorts of grain and potatoes will be made during the oming winter and spring to Canadian farmers. The samples will consist of spring wheat (about 5 lbs.). white oats (about 4 lbs.), barley (about 5 lbs.), and field peas (about 5 lbs.). These will be sent out from Ottawa.

A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb CHICAGO samples) will be carried on from several of the Experimental Farms, the Central Farm at Ottawa supplying DALLAS, FORTH WORTH, only the provinces of Ontario and HOUSTON, GALVESTON and Quebec.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Domin-ion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestad on a farm of at least 80 acres, on cersoil on which he intends to sow the seed All applications for grain (and applications from the provinces of On-

tario and Ouebec for potatoes) should be addressed to the Dominion Cerealist, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Such applications require no oostage. If otherwise addressed, delay and disappointment may occur. 


