Ready to Make Peace

Terms on Which the Khalifa of Egypt Would Submit, And Acknowledge the Suzerainty of the Queen.

The Peace Treaty Between Greece and Turkey Signed.

Twenty-Five Vessels Wrecked in the Bay of Naples - Spain Will Demand Damages of Uncle Sam - A Bloodless Duel.

AUSTRIA'S NAVAL COMMANDER DEAD.

Vienna, Dec. 6.-Admiral Baron von SIECH, commander-in-chief of the Austro-Hungarian navy, died here yesterday.

SPAIN TO DEMAND DAMAGES. Madrid, Dec. 6.-Spanish Government has received details of the landing of an expedition in Cuba from the American steamer Dauntless, and it is understood the Spanish minister at Washington, Senor Dupuy De Lome, will shortly present in this connection a claim for damages from the United States.

THE KHALIFA WANTS PEACE. London, Dec. 6.-It is reported that the Khalifa is disposed to conclude peace with Egypt, on condition that he be granted hereditary power over Kordofan and Darfur, and that all his adherents be pardoned. The dervish leader is also said to be ready to evacuate the whole Nile Valley, to recognize the suzerainty of Queen Victoria and open his domains to British commerce.

THE TURKISH LEGATION AT WASHINGTON has received the following cable from Constantinople: "The definite treaty of peace between the sublime porte and Greece has been signed this day."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 6.-The final treaty of peace between Turkey and Greece was formally signed by the representatives of the two governments at 3:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The ratification of the treaty is to take place fifteen days later.

DUEL IN PARIS. A Paris dispatch says: A duel was fought today between M. Millerand, the well-known Socialist deputy, and M. Joseph Reinhold, a member of the Chamber for the district of Digne, a well-known journalist and author, editor of the Republican Francaise. The encounter grew out of some remarks exchanged in the chamber yesterday during the Dreyfus debate. Both men fired twice, but neither was hurt. Their seconds declared that honor was satisfied.

THE ENGINEERS' TROUBLE. London, Dec. 6.-Right Hon. Charles T. Ritchie, president of the board of trade, declines on behalf of the board of trade, to accede to the request of the men that he should interfere in the present labor dispute, and in arranging a conference between the Amalgamated Society of Railway Men and the railway companies as a whole in order to avert a strike. Mr. Ritchie reminds the men, in substance, that they are a specially privileged body, that their present attitude is unjustifiable.

TROOPS FOR MOMBASA. London, Dec. 6.-The 27th Bombay Infantry, with a field hospital, large quantities of telegraph equipment, and several lakhs of rupees, for immediate expenses, sailed from Bombay yesterday for the island of Mombasa, west coast of Africa, where 10,000 coolies will be engaged to accompany the troops. The expedition is under the direct orders of the British war office. The island of Mombasa belongs to Zanzibar, which is included in the East Africa protectorate of Great Britain. Mombasa is the capital of what is known as the Coast Province.

TWENTY-FIVE VESSELS WRECKED. Rome, Dec. 6.-Tidal storms have prevailed for three days over large parts of Italy. In the Bay of Naples 25 merchantmen have been wrecked, though there have been loss of life, and several houses on the sea front have collapsed. Considerable damage has been done at Rome and in the district around the city. Almost all parts of Italy have suffered in a measure, and railway communication has been seriously interrupted. The harbor of Portici, on the Bay of Naples, has been greatly damaged, and it is feared that there have been some fatalities there.

MERELY A PRETEXT. Germany Uses the Missionary Outrage in China as a Means to Secure a Coaling Station.

Berlin, Dec. 6.-When the German reinforcements, numbering 22 officers and 1,200 men, and a company of naval artillery, numbering 200 men, arrive at Kiao Chau Bay, for which point they will soon set out, they will bring the total German force there up to 4,566 men, the largest body Germany has ever sent beyond the European waters. It is expected that the reserves will have to be drawn upon.

The admiralty denies that other European squadrons have entered the harbor at Kiao Chau to watch Germany's proceedings, and it is believed that Admiral Von Diederich would protest vigorously against such an attempt.

The Kolnische Zeitung regards the expedition as being a tactical aim, first, to obtain missionary reparations, and second, to obtain the cession of Kiao Chau as payment for past services rendered by Germany in connection with the conclusion of peace with Japan.

Most self-congratulation among the Germans that the missionary incident absolves the government from the tedious and perhaps abortive process of diplomatically claiming a coaling station in the form of a demand for a treaty port or a settlement on perpetual lease. The Premier

Unanimously Renominated by His Constituents.

Opposition Must Face Their Statements in the House.

Telling Exposure of Ill-Founded Stories Already Made.

Brantford, Dec. 6.-South Brant Liberals met in convention here on Saturday, unanimously renominated Premier Hardy for the coming elections, and passed resolutions of confidence in both the Dominion and provincial administrations.

The premier was loudly cheered when he rose to speak. He pointed out that the present government was practically new, having only held the reins of power for eighteen months, but it had gained the confidence of the people as thoroughly as under the regime of Sir Oliver Mowat. It had been as fruitful, progressive and honest as any similar period under Sir Oliver, and left nothing on which Mr. Whitney might found charges. The speaker was the one member left of the old and great party headed by Sir Oliver Mowat, which had fought the great battle for the autonomy of the province against Sir John A. Macdonald. He was the link connecting the present administration with the one which had fought and won the fight for the province's rights, and the ownership of half its area. (Applause.) Mr. Gibson had recently pointed to the speaker as the oldest member of the administration. There was a department of half its area, government over which he had not presided at one time or another, and the experience gained in this service stood him in excellent stead. The premier stated that in opposition to the wish of Mr. Whitney and his friends, the government insisted on the full discussion of the policy when the speech from the throne was considered. They invited objections to their policy, and was placed in the power of the opposition to state their objections. Therefore the debate was forced, so that the opposition could state their positions and have their statements answered. He said that it dealt with the house was primarily the proper place to discuss these matters. The government wanted no shirking, and face-to-face discussion was exactly what it desired. If the government advanced one claim more than another in the daylight, and that it dealt openly and frankly with the people. There was not a single action which it was ashamed to lay before the people, the Liberal principle being that no secrecy should be permitted in the government of this province any more than with the county and township councils. Every step taken by the government must, would and ought to be open to every man, woman and child. Liberals always invited discussion. It had been said that the government employed five times as many paid officers as it did 25 years ago. This was false, and he challenged them to prove it. The challenge was passed by; Mr. Matheson was dumb, and the reason was evident for it could never be proved. Then the opposition spoke of the "hordes of officials" which met them on every hand. Dr. Sproule had stated on a platform beside Mr. Whitney that there were in the province 500,000 over-seers of roads. If Mr. Whitney had possessed any manliness he would have sprung to his feet and exposed the falsity of this statement, for he knew it was false. As a matter of fact, there were in the entire province only 200 over-seers engaged on the colonization roads. In East Algoma, 600 miles wide by 700 miles long, there were 40 in all; other portion, 200 miles wide by 300 long, there were 30, and in some other parts as many as ten. Yet Mr. Whitney did not correct the falsehood, and the statement is being spread broadcast from Mr. Whitney's platform. Then the opposition went on saying that the Liberals had never had a surplus in any year while they were in power. This was a matter of fact, and the speaker stated that the Liberals had a surplus of 19 years, and this year it was greater than ever. His hearers should be wary of such statements and take care that all were verified. Everything the Liberals had done was on record, and the above were some of the country, a tour that the leader of the opposition said was such a triumph. Madrid, Dec. 6.-President McKinley's message to congress is not hostile to Spain, the Cortes will be dissolved, and the elections for the next body fixed for February next. United States Minister Woodford gave a banquet Saturday night to the members of the diplomatic corps in Madrid.

INHALED CHARCOAL FUMES. Paris, Dec. 6.-The septuagenarian Marchioness de Hiquelias committed suicide on Saturday night in the garret in the Rue de Belloy by inhaling charcoal fumes. After lighting the charcoal stove she drank a pint of absinthe and then lay down on her bed, folding her arms, and was in this position when her body was found. A little blind pet dog had been the only companion of the aged woman since she had sunk into poverty.

GOING TO PIECES! Schooner Lulu Beatrice, at Port Stanley, Likely to Prove a Total Wreck.

[Western Press Special to Advertiser.] St. Thomas, Ont., Dec. 6.-The schooner Lulu Beatrice, from Port Burwell (Capt. Peter Haggiebell), bound to Port Stanley, sail laden, which went ashore at the latter port yesterday morning in a heavy gale, is breaking up, and will likely go to pieces. The barrels of salt consigned to Bert Day, Port Stanley, were safely landed.

IN JACK FROST'S DOMAIN An Ice Storm - A Skating Accident at Jonesville, Mich.

Owasco, Mich., Dec. 6.-A heavy ice storm prevailed here all day Sunday, interfering, however, only slightly with street car travel. During the morning the cars had to wade up.

PELLED ON AN ICY WALK. Pontiac, Mich., Dec. 6.-Mrs. Reeves, a resident of Mount Clemens street, this city, fell on the icy sidewalk near her home and broke her thigh. She is 55 years of age, and doctors say she will recover.

DROWNED. Jonesville, Mich., Dec. 6.-The body of George, the 11-year-old son of L. E. Platt of this place, was found in the water back of his house, where it had probably laid since yesterday afternoon, when he was last seen. FAST TRAVELING.

Great Record Made by the Union Pacific Railroad.

Celebrating its new birth, the Union Pacific has taken two more falls out of Father Time and has set a new fast running that will likely stand in the west for some time. An Omaha dispatch says: Last Tuesday the fast mail made a 520-mile run at the rate of 62 1/2 miles an hour with a hundred-mile dash at the rate of 68 1/2 miles an hour. Yesterday the same train ran 42 miles from Kearney to Grand Island, in 36 minutes, or 70 miles an hour. The 261 miles from Sidney to Grand Island was made in 238 minutes, an average of 65 1/2 miles an hour. Today a special train was run from Julesburg to Council Bluffs, 294 miles, in 238 minutes. The average speed for the actual running time was 63 1/2 miles an hour.

HAIR GROWS AFTER DEATH. Columbia, City, Ind., Dec. 6.-Five years ago Edna, the 10-year-old daughter of Rev. J. Merritt Driver, now of Marion, Ind., died in this city. Last evening the remains were exhumed for the purpose of burial elsewhere. Upon opening the casket a remarkable state of preservation was revealed, the features being easily recognized. What most puzzled the spectators was seeing her head enveloped in a matted mass of bushy, stubbly hair, which by actual measurement had grown eight inches since her burial. In color it was the same as in life.
