Fowler was greatly touched by the kindness
of his congregation and wished them even
greater prosperity than they had yet en-
joyed. A review of the church work was
given, and showed that when he took
charge, a little over two years, there were
27 names on the members' rolls. Since then
122 had been added, by baptism and other-
wise; 8 were baptized, but had not become
members, while 29 had been dismissed by
letter and otherwise. Mrs. Fowler was
active in every branch of the church work,
and the Y. P. S. C. E. presented her with an
address and a heavy oak easy chair. What is
London's loss is Toronto's gain. At the con-
clusion of every person acquainted with
Mr. and Mrs. Fowler.
