A HAPLESS ARMY. The New York Sun has a special ca-

No proper camping grounds have been prepared for the troops advanc-ing to the front, although they have often started with only a day or two's rations, and, as a not unnatural result, whole regiments have straggled into Bartieri's camp starving, ragged, shoeless, with half their numbers minus their rifles and knapsacks, which were thrown away by men too weak

to carry them.

To sum up this damning indictment of military incompetence, the Italian army, now faced by a gallant, chival-reus, confident and numerous foe, ready to suffer and die in the defense of their country, had not more than 40 rounds of ammunition per man. THEIR LAST VOYAGE.

Serious Loss of Life on the Coast of Massachusetts.

Three Vessels Blown Ashore in a Heavy Gale-Eleven Persons Perish.

Gloucester, Mass., Feb. three-masted schooner Alliance, which left New York a week ago, went ashore on Plum Island, Sunday night, and was beaten to fragments, four of the crew being saved and three drowned.

Capt. Mellons, of St. John, N. B., 30 years old, unmarried; John Reed, of Calads, Me., aged 26; Andrew D. Cook, of Springhill, N. S., 40 years.

The schooner had 400 tons of coal for St. Johns, N. B. The captain kept off shore in the teeth of a streaking northeast gale, but he soon heard the whistling buoy and sighted Plum Island light. Before he realized the schooner struck, floated and was driven a mile up the beach through the breakers. She struck head on, the spars came out and she went to pieces. EIGHT PERISHED.

Amesbury, Mass., Feb. 11.—The schooner Florida, of Belfast, Me., coal laden, went ashore off Salisbury Beach Sunday evening during a heavy gale. At 10 o'clock the vessel went to pieces, and the eight men who were aboard her lost their lives. The drowned are: Arthur Brown, captain; E. McCullock, Albert Williams, Gus Smith, John E. Johnson, Walter Bell, Wm. Wills, and

one unknown man. The life-saving crew could do nothing, as no boat could stand the sea. The vessel struck the sand bar near where the schooner Jennie M. Carter was wrecked a year ago in a treacherous spot. Big bonfires were built one the beach and attempts made by fishermen to reach the fated schooner.
