Christmas trade is said to be worse than usual, principally because continental manufacturers, who have an increasing monopoly of British holiday wares, seen this year to have produced nothing at ali in the way of attractive novelties.

Bimetalism in England. London, Dec. 25 .-- Lord Salisbury' speech in the Upper House during the debate on Indian finance is regarded as a

speech in the Upper House during the debate on Indian finance is regarded as a definite pronouncement in favor of international bimetalism. It is possibly destined to have momentous consequences. Sanguine bimetalisms predict the early inclusion of their currency scheme as a plank of the orthodox Tory platform; but that is scarcely probable until the numerous Tory monometalists have been converted. The subject acquired considerable prominence in the Accrington election contests, but that is scarcely to be wondered at because Lancashire has long been the stronghold of bimetalism. Even the Liberal newspapers of that county are compelled, owing to the pressure of local option, to keep an open mind on currency matters, and some of them at present are giving considerable space to the discussion of the silver problem.
