AMERICANS IN HARD LUCK.

London, Oct. 2.—The Newmarket meeting proved disastrous to the American riders and backers. Riley Grannan, Young Dwyer, Grey and others no longer deny the disastrous finish of their efforts to defeat the English bookmakers. Lord William Beresford had at least £200,000 (£1,000,000 invested in American mounts, besides paying Sloan \$5,000, but he has been unable to secure the prices for his entries. The "bookies" put a prohibitive price on all of Sloan's mounts. This disadvantage was twice evaded by Lord Beresford by buying a ticket for the race, and announcing his intended departure. Sloan, of course, returned at the last moment to ride the race. Lord Beresford is said to be contemplating sending his American horses to India.

TRAGEDY NEAR WARDSVILLE

Philip McPhail Shoots the Daughter of P. Doyle.

And Then Dies by His Own Hand—The Girl May Recover.

Rodney, Ont., Oct. 2.—On Friday night about 6 o'clock Philip McPhail, who worked for P. Doyle, farmer, near Wardsville, shot the latter's oldest daughter, about 19 years of age, and afterwards went to his home, about a mile from Doyle's place, and shot himself in the left breast, dying about 12 o'clock at night.

Miss Doyle was shot in the left ear. The doctor in attendance thinks she will recover.

No reason is known why McPhail committed the act.

ANOTHER STORY.

Another account says: A terrible tragedy occurred on Friday evening in the township of Aldboro, Philip McPhail, who lives on the second concession, near the village of Chatham, attempted to kill Miss Doyle, and, failing, put a bullet in his own brain, dying five hours later. Particulars of the affair are hard to obtain.

As far as can be learned, a man named Philip McPhail attempted to kill Miss Doyle, daughter of Patrick Doyle, at the latter's residence, on the third concession of Aldboro. McPhail shot at the young woman, the bullet glancing on the skull and lodging in her shoulder. After discharging the contents of the revolver, and an attempt made to arrest him, upon McPhail's noticing the approach of the men, he pulled a revolver from his pocket and shot himself on his own doorstep. He died five hours later. It is expected Miss Doyle will recover.

McPhail was a brother-in-law of Doyle, and the young lady shot is a daughter of Mr. Doyle by his first marriage.

SUPPOSED TO HAVE BEEN INSANE.

Rodney, Ont., Oct. 2.—Word reached here Saturday afternoon of a fatal shooting affray, which was enacted on Friday evening about 7 o'clock, on the farm of John Doyle, a farmer living about five miles from this place. For some time past considerable ill-feeling has existed between Philip McPhail, a young farmer, residing with his mother about a mile and a half from the Doyle farm. It culminated on the evening mentioned when McPhail called at the Doyle home, and encountered his own sister, Miss Doyle, and a small child, Miss Doyle carrying the latter in her arms. McPhail, by threats, succeeded in changing his sister out of the house, and then commanded Miss Doyle to put the child down. The young lady refused to do this, whereupon McPhail pulled a revolver and threatened to shoot her. The girl's head, the ball entering at the ear and taking a downward course.

Leaving Miss Doyle for dead, McPhail then proceeded to his home, and upon arrival there turned the weapon on himself, sending a bullet into his breast. Doctors were summoned immediately in both cases, but McPhail's wound proved fatal, and he died shortly after the doctor arrived.

In Miss Doyle's case the doctors held out strong hopes of recovery. McPhail had been brooding over some family wrong done him by the Doyle family for some time, and it is thought while temporarily insane he committed the rash act.

Mr. and Mrs. Doyle were visiting the Rodneys at the time, and may owe their lives to the visit, as McPhail would have likely shot the old couple as well.
