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stallion lens, etc., removed from the eyeball. I may remark that my experiments lasted a whole year, and I have therefore tried frogs at all seasons. He finally gives directions for keeping the animal quiet. If the frog is not curarized, the sciatic and cranial nerves are cut through. It is, however, sufficient to fasten the head completely to the cork to immobilize the animal. The dissection of the trigeminal nerve is difficult. "Prof. Brucke says ('Lectures on Physiology,' vol. II, page 78: 'The first sign that the trigeminal is divided is a loud piercing shriek from the animal. Rabbits we know are not very sensitive, but in this operation they invariably send forth a prolonged shriek.' "In Pfleger's 'Archives,' vol. II, page 234, are accounts of similar experiments on curarized cats, a large number of them having the nerves cut, dissected out and stimulated, the spine opened, spinal marrow cut, etc. "I could quote still more shameful vivisection records from this paper, but I leave the stomach for it. STAMPS SPREAD DISEASE

Dangers Which Confront Philatelists in Pursuing Their Fad.

It is stated by a responsible medical journal that a surgeon in the French army has just discovered that stamp collectors may be the means of disseminating tuberculosis by means of the stamps, says the Chicago Chronicle. A man in his employ was a great stamp collector, and occupied his spare time in fixing the stamps in albums or on sheets of gummed paper for sale, moistening the stamps for the purpose with his tongue.

Three hundred of the stamps were placed in sterilized water, and with some of the water eight guinea pigs were inoculated. Each died with characteristic tuberculous lesions. Children, says the journal, should be warned against placing any stamps near their mouths in order to moisten them, and foreign stamps should be disinfected in a 5 per cent solution of carbolic acid before adding them to collections.

Dr. Boyd on Sunday Golf.

Lovers of the ancient and honorable game of golf who find it difficult to withstand the temptation to follow the ball over the grassy links on Sunday will doubtless have their attention attracted to the very plain utterances upon this subject by the Rev. John H. Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Evanston.

Of course no one expects a defense of Sunday golf from a minister of the gospel. When Dr. Boyd announced that the subject of his Sunday morning discourse would be "God or Golf?" it was therefore a safe prediction that he would present some very cogent reasons why golfers should abstain from that pastime on the Sabbath day.

What Dr. Boyd said about Sunday golf, however, was only a feature of a very able and logical discourse on the Sabbath question in general. The fact that the pastor of one of the leading churches in Evanston—in fact, one of the largest in the West—should feel constrained to preach with such earnestness upon a question in which he would present some very cogent reasons why golfers should abstain from that pastime on the Sabbath day.

The observations of Dr. Boyd, however, may well be pondered by golfers outside of the Evanstonians. They cannot be indifferently dismissed by those who have been wont to regard golf as a sport for the educated and the refined. Can this exhilarating pastime maintain its standing against the encroachments of the Sabbath-breaker?

There can be no doubt that men of intelligence and of rational life, churchmen and those who belong to no church, look with apprehension upon the increasing tendency to pervert the Sabbath into a day devoted to bicycling, baseball, golf or some form of sport.

The Sunday golfer would never vote to destroy the Sabbath. If put to the test he would vigorously defend the Christian Sabbath. He would stand against a day of universal labor, revelry and outdoor sports. And yet he denies that he is doing his part to usher in the Sunday that has no rest or peace or calm in it for anybody?

Johnston at a Queen street eat restaurant, when Johnston rushed out, and with his pocket knife stabbed John Gordon in the head behind the right ear. The stroke severed an artery, and Johnston followed it up by stabbing Gordon in the leg as he turned to run. Gordon was taken to the General Hospital and Johnston was arrested. The doctors say that Gordon will probably die.
