Pilgrims Swarming to Mecca. Lordon, June 28.—The pilgrimage to Mecca has been extraordinarily large this year, the total number of pilgrims already heing about double that of last year. Over 20,000 have passed through Suez alone, and it is estimated an equal number have arrived at Mecca by overland caravans. The usual resultant conditions of the pilgrim ceason favorable to epidemics have been consequently aggravated, and the Egyptian Quaranthe Board has declared all the Hadjaz littoral to be foul and applied severe measures to prevent the spread of cholera and other diseases. Cholera has been rife at Mecca for some time.

CHARLESTON, S. C., June 29.—This is the limit which is generally set for the Evans law, by which the State assumes control of the liquor traffic, to last, All the swell clubs have agreed to obey the law and there are auctions in progress at the Charleston, Queen City, the Yacht and other society clubs, at which the entire stock of liquors is being knocked down to the highest bidder. There is one large brewery in the city. This will probably be closed. On July 1 more than 200 places of business—saloons, restaurants and wholesale liquor houses—will be for rent.
