Echoes of the Great Disaster.

LONDON, June 28.—In a dispatch dated June 26, Rear Admiral Markham reports that Admiral Tynon's telescope and the dispatch box and cap were recovered, but the body had not been found. Markham had transferred his flag to the warship Nile.

LONDON, June 28.—Capt. Bourke, the senior officer among the survivors of the warship Victoria, will be tried by a special naval board sitting at Malta for having lost the vessel. Further proceedings will depend upon the result of this trial. No steps will be taken in the matter of court-martialing Rear Admiral Markham and the officers of the Camperdown until after the end of Bourke's case.

Pilgrims Swarming to Mecca.

LONDON, June 28.—The pilgrimage to Mecca has been extraordinarily large this year, the total number of pilgrims already being about double that of last year. Over 40,000 have passed through Suez alone, and it is estimated that nearly a million have arrived at Mecca by overland caravans. The usual resultant conditions of the pilgrimage season favorable to epidemics have been consequently aggravated, and the Egyptian Quarantine Board has declared all the Hajj littoral to be foul and applied severe measures to prevent the spread of cholera and other diseases. Cholera has been rife at Mecca for some time.

Nearly Another Disaster.

LONDON, June 28.—The new British battleship Hood came very near meeting grave disaster recently, less than a week after she was commissioned. She was found one day to be leaking badly, and the water gained so rapidly that she had to be docked. The leak was caused by the opening of the seam of two of her keel plates, which had not been properly riveted. Instead of the rivets being driven properly home, they had been driven half way in, and dummy studs placed on the other side. The discovery caused considerable excitement, as had the Hood been at sea when the plates started, disaster could have been inevitable.

International Courtesies.

LONDON, June 28.—Augustin Daly's new theater was opened here last night. All the seats in the house were sold. Among others who attended were Ambassador Bayard, United States Consul-General Collins, Mr. and Mrs. Waldorf Astor, George Gould and Mrs. Gould, Justice Day, Sir Arthur Sullivan, the Lord Mayor of London and the Lady Mayoress, Ada Rehan recited a poem written by Clement Scott. The final lines are: "Incense together with heart and with voice, hail for Columbia, God save the Queen. The audience as Miss Rehan recited the words cheered and applauded. After the demonstration, which lasted for five

minutes, all remained on their feet while the company sang "Hail Columbia" and "God Save the Queen."

"Time!"

LONDON, June 28.—In the House of Commons to-day Mr. John W. Bonn (Liberal) and Mr. Samuel Woods (Labour) asked the questions, priority of which had been given to the House in relation to the closing of the discussion of the Home Rule Bill.

Mr. Gladstone, in reply, briefly announced that tomorrow he would move the adoption of a resolution calling upon the House to expedite the passage of the bill. Mr. Gladstone added that the terms of the resolution were nearly prepared, and he hoped to communicate it to the House during the day.

The Right Hon. Mr. Balfour asked that the terms of the resolution be communicated to the Opposition leaders before they were publicly stated in the House.

With subtle irony Mr. Gladstone informed Mr. Balfour that the resolution was based on the proposal made by the Conservatives by Mr. the Crimes Act was rushed through Parliament in 1887.

Mr. John Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland, subsequently made the terms of the resolution. They provide that the bill shall be reported by July 31.

Mr. T. W. Russell, Liberal Unionist, gave notice that he would submit an amendment to the resolution.

Mr. Balfour asked the Government proposed to consider the motion for adoption of the resolution tomorrow. Did the Government, he asked, remember the occasion of the introduction of the resolution of 1887 referred to by Mr. the Minister? On that occasion Mr. the Minister and Mr. Morley had both protested against the resolution, although that proposal was vastly less complicated than the present one.

When Mr. Gladstone rose to reply to Mr. Balfour he was enthusiastically cheered. He readily admitted the action in 1887, but said that the question of the House then was that a resolution like the one referred to ought not to be kept pending. Moreover, the House has already gone through an immense mass of work and a still greater amount was waiting its attention. Indeed, he became a question as to whether the House was not able to discharge the duties which it had to perform.

Mr. Gladstone further said that the question in 1887 as existed on the grounds of public duty he had felt to accede to the wish of Mr. Balfour that further time be given to the consideration of the terms of the resolution.

The sitting closed amid loud cheering on the part of the Liberal and Liberal Unionist members.

LONDON, June 29.—An extraordinary decline has taken place in the price of silver in the market here. The fall was 2 1/2, making the price 31 3/4.

Tyran's Successor.

LONDON, June 29.—Vice Admiral Sir Michael Culme-Seymour has been appointed commander-in-chief of the British Mediterranean station, to succeed Vice Admiral Sir George Tyrn, who is to retire on the Victoria.

Their Sentences May Be Remitted.

LONDON, June 28.—In reply to a question asked the Government in the House of Commons, Sir Edward Grey, Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, stated that the Government had reason to hope that the sentences pronounced against the seventeen Armenians were not so severe as they appeared, and that the Government were not unlikely to hear of the remission of the sentences of the Grand Duke Ernest, who had probably fled a bride much nearer to the date than the Grand Duke's early marriage. The Grand Duke's early marriage was anxiously desired, inasmuch as he had a brother, and both his uncles have married and have renounced the right of succession.

BEYOND THEIR DEPTH.

Several Young People Drowned While Bathing.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 28.—While bathing in a bayou near Little Rock Sunday afternoon, the 9-year-old son of Dr. J. W. King got beyond his depth and screamed for help. When his 7-year-old sister ran to the bank and attempted to help her brother, she was pulled into the water and both were drowned.

Ottawa, June 28.—Jean Guillard, aged 17, while bathing near Eddy's paper mills at Hull this morning, with two companions, sank suddenly and never came up. Cramps are supposed.

James K. Elliott, aged 9, son of James Elliott, of the Postoffice Department, while bathing with other lads beneath Parliament Hill here, got beyond his depth and was drowned.

MONCTON, N. B., June 28.—Last evening Birdie Smith, aged 12, her sister, two years older, and a younger girl, Dora Woods, started to walk across a boom on Tarble Creek. Birdie Smith and Dora Woods fell into the water. Birdie was drowned, but Dora managed to crawl out.

Cayley Hamilton, barrister, of Regina, to Florence C. second daughter of Horace Horton, ex-M.P. A dispatch received from Winnipeg, Man., states that the condition of Chief Justice Taylor, who met with a serious accident recently, is improved.

The Postoffice Department is sending out circulars with a view of learning the number of newspapers carried free by the mails, as the department has no such statistics.

The Dominion line steamship Texas, from Montreal, with a shipment of 385 cattle, arrived at Avonmouth dock Tuesday and landed her live stock all in good condition.

The C. P. R. express leaving Ottawa for the west Tuesday night moved down a herd of cattle at Britannia. Seven cows were killed. The train went on undisturbed.

Fifty lads from Dr. Barnardo's home in London, Eng., arrived at the Union station, Toronto, on Tuesday, en route to various points in Ontario, where they had been previously engaged.

At Toronto on Wednesday the court was again asked to commit Editor William MacGill, of the Tilsonburg Liberal, for contempt of court, arising out of the prosecution suit of Southwick vs. Hare. Motion dismissed.

Ex-Mayor John Breden, of Kingston, died in that city on Wednesday.

The Manitoba Grand Lodge of Good Templars is in session at Winnipeg.

Hon. J. M. Gibson and family, Hamilton, will leave for Europe towards the end of next month.

"Genny" Curtis, mate on the ferryboat Hope at Windsor, was horsewhipped on Wednesday night by Mrs. Carwright, of that town. The woman claims Curtis made derogatory remarks about her character.

THE I. O. G. T.

Interesting Proceedings of the Grand Lodge.

The Official Organ to Be Dropped—Great Advance Made by Temperance During the Past Year.

HAMILTON, June 28.—When the Grand Lodge resumed at 2 p.m. yesterday, Dr. Mann, of Brooklyn, N. Y., supreme grand chief templar, conducted an initiatory drill for about an hour and a half, during which he exemplified the secret work.

The remainder of the session was taken up with an interesting address by Mrs. S. G. Mann, of Toronto, grand superintendent of juvenile templars, on juvenile work.

At Association Hall, in the evening, a public meeting was held, Mr. F. S. Morrison, grand councillor, presiding. The meeting was opened by an address of welcome, on behalf of the Good Templars of Hamilton, and greetings of the Royal Templars of Temperance and the Christian Endeavor societies of the city.

Mr. John Sutherland delivered a brief address on Good Templary in Scotland, which was followed by addresses by Mrs. G. G. Mann, international missionary, and by Rev. Mr. Dobbin on "Young Men in Good Templary Work." The closing address was by Dr. Mann, supreme grand chief templar, on the interesting subject of "Women's Part in Temperance Work."

In his address the chief templar stated that the past year had witnessed the greatest advance ever made in the temperance movement in Canada, and that in all the elections held in the past year the temperance movement had not sustained a single defeat. Since the last Grand Lodge meeting he had visited every Province in Canada and many of the States of the Union. Two-thirds of the Province of New Brunswick is under the domination of sobriety law, while the Scott Act is in force in every county in Nova Scotia except that of Halifax. Not a license is sold in Prince Edward Island outside of the city of Charlottetown, and the municipalities of Quebec have local option, and the cause has made good progress in Ontario. Eighty municipalities of 11 in Manitoba have temperance legislation, and last fall at an election 10,000 votes were cast for prohibition with 7,000 against. British Columbia is having passed an act compelling applicants to present a petition signed by two-thirds of the legal voters of the municipality, and if on a boundary line by two-thirds of the adjoining municipalities together with two-thirds of the married couples of good moral character within the municipality before such license can be granted. It was more convinced than ever that prohibition must be the ultimate goal of temperance work.

The various standing committees of Grand Lodge were appointed.

The time of the morning session was consumed almost entirely in the discussion of a report on the official organ of the order. It was resolved to no longer continue the Canada Citizen as the official organ, an experiment of a year ago having proved a failure. It was an organ it was resolved to use the daily and weekly press of the country, the work in connection therewith being assigned to the executive.

MINE DISASTER.

Two Men Mortally Injured and Several Badly Hurt.

MOUNT CARMEL, Pa., June 23.—An explosion of gas occurred at Green Ridge colliery this morning. Dominick Roderly was killed; Chester Mander was fatally injured; five men were seriously hurt and several others slightly. Fourteen men were in the gangway when the explosion occurred, most of whom saved themselves by jumping into the ditch.

ACCIDENT AT THE FAIR.

The Floor of the Paint Shop Gives Way—Twelve Men Hurt.

WORLD'S FAIR GROUNDS, CHICAGO, Ill., June 23.—The second floor of the color department (the paint shop of the fair) gave way under the weight of fifteen men at 8 o'clock to-night. Twelve men had limbs broken or otherwise injured, but no one was killed.

Mining Business Bad.

CLEVELAND, O., June 28.—The situation on the lakes and in the relative history of ore mining is in such a depressed condition as has not been known in years. Mine after mine is shut down. W. G. Purging the Pension Rolls.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 28.—The work of purging the pension rolls of impostors has apparently begun in earnest. To-day a long list of names was sent to Secretary Smith by Commissioner Lochren, giving in addition to the name the number of pension certificate and such other data as was deemed essential, with the recommendation, which has been approved, that the same be dropped from the pension rolls. In this list eleven were deserters.

The Mexican drought has been relieved by heavy rains. Many houses in Potosi have been swept away by the flood.

News has been received in San Francisco that the catch of sealers punching off the Alaskan coast will aggregate 70,000 seals this year.

A special dispatch says that the people of Charleston, S. C., have been laying in private stocks of liquor sufficient to last six months, as there will be no State dispensary in that city after July 1.

The San Antonio and Arkansas passenger train was held up 30 miles south of San Antonio, Texas, Wednesday. T. N. Martin, a fireman, was killed as was also one of the robbers. No booty was secured.

Archbishop Tache, St. Boniface, Man., has published an open letter to Mr. Tarte, in which he repels to and very emphatically denies that gentlemen's statements asserting that Mr. Chaplain, in the name of the Federal Government, had entered into negotiations with him (the archbishop) respecting the Manitoba School Act, and that a compromise had been agreed upon. CLOSING UP THE SALOONS.

The Evans Law Coming Into Force in Charleston—Swallow Clubs Sift Their Liquor.

CHARLESTON, S. C., June 29.—This is the limit which is generally set for the Evans law, by which the State assumes control of the liquor traffic, to last. All the well known saloons, restaurants and hotels are closing up. There is one large brewery in the city. This will probably be closed. On July 1 more than 200 places of business—saloons, restaurants and wholesale liquor houses—will be for rent.

BOTH WERE KILLED.

Bad Railway Accident Near Renfrew—A Young Woman Loses Her Life to Save a Child's.

RENFREW, Ont., June 29.—A fatal accident occurred on the C. P. R. tracks here on Wednesday evening. The C. P. R. local train going east ran over and killed Nellie, the 4-year-old daughter of Mr. Robert Henderson, and Isabelle Early, his sister-in-law, 26 years of age. They were returning from berry-picking and walking on the railway track, the whistling of the approaching train confused the little one, who ran down the track ahead of the engine. Miss Early rushed along to get her off and had just reached her when the locomotive struck them both. The child was instantly killed. Miss Early lived a few moments. Mrs. Henderson and a 6-year-old daughter were with the others and witnessed the sad affair.
