Two sections of train No. 3-one coming from Detroit and the other from Toledo-were consolidated in this city into a train of eleven cars, making up the flyer for its journey to St. Louis. It consisted of a combination baggage and smoker, day coach, im-migrant coach, three chair cars, three sleepers and the private car of General Superintendent Wm. Cotton, of the Iron Mountain Railway.

BEHIND TIME. Having left this city one hour late, the train was speeding westward at high speed when, at a point nine miles west the engine

PLUNGED THROUGH A TRESTLE, which had been undermined by the recent heavy rains. The embankment on both sides of the little stream dropped at a sharp degree, a distance of 40 feet. Owing to the momentum of the train, the engine leaped across the abyss, plunged into the soft earth on the opposite side, and fell back to the bottom. THE LEIPZIC BANK SMASH. Berlin, June 25.-The crash of the Leipziger Bank was a complete sur-prise to the Berlin boerse, where yesterday the bank shares were quoted at 140. This failure now turns out to be worse than at first reported. The Leipziger Bank had practically become the owner of the Cassel Trocknung Company, which in itself was financially unsound. Well informed Berlin financiers fear that the Leipziger Bank will save little, if anything, out of the wreck. Nearly all other values on the boerse dropped, while the stock of the Saxon Bank, the Leipzig Savings Bank, the Leipzig Mortgage Bank and the Magdeburg Bank Verein were struck off the Berlin quotations. The Frankfurt main boerse reacted similarly on news of the Leipzig failure, all the bank stock dealt in there losing from 8 to 9 points. The newspapers tonight intimate that the directors of the Leipziger Bank will be criminally pro-secuted. The Lokal Anzeiger estimates the liabilities of the Leipziger

Bank at 85,000,000 to 90,000,000 marks, against assets amounting to 48,000,000
