WOODS' FAIR

REV. JAS. ROLLINS INDUCTED INTO KING STREET PASTORATE

Simple Ceremony Witnessed by Large Audience.

Sermons and Addresses Delivered by Well-Known Clergymen.

The vacancy which has existed in the pastorate of the King Street Presbyterian Church since the resignation of Rev. Thomas Wilson in December last was filled last night, when Rev. James Rollins, of Elmville, the unanimous choice of the congregation, was inducted into the charge. The induction was witnessed by an audience made up largely of members and adherents of the church, but there were also many from the Presbyterian congregations in the city. There was a coincidence in connection with the induction. The former pastor of the church, Mr. Wilson, was inducted into the pastorate of the church at Walkerton on the same day that his successor took charge of the work here. This was referred to by Rev. J. G. Stuart, of Knox Church, who had acted as interim moderator in the King Street call and who last night was called upon, as is the custom, to relate the steps which led up to the call to Mr. Rollins.

A SIMPLE CEREMONY.
The induction was a very simple ceremony, occupying only a few minutes, and it was conducted by the moderator of the Presbyterian, Rev. R. W. Leitch, of Delaware. It followed the sermon by Rev. S. D. Jamieson, of Newbury, and consisted merely of the answering of the prescribed series of questions, put to the new pastor, and the giving of the right hand of fellowship by the other members of the Presbyterian present, among whom were Revs. Alex. Henderson, of Appin, clerk of the Presbytery; Dr. McCrae, of St. James; Dr. Drummond, of St. Thomas; R. C. McDermid, of Aylmer; S. D. Jamieson; T. A. Watson, of Thamesford; Hector McKay, and the following local clergymen: Revs. W. J. Clark, J. G. Stuart, Walter Moffatt, and A. J. MacGillivray. Rev. Dr. Johnston was absent in Toronto. Rev. Murdoch Mackenzie, of Toronto, was among the visitors.

THE INDUCTION SERMON.
The induction sermon was preached by Rev. S. D. Jamieson, who chose as his subject "The disappointment of the world with Christ." He devoted his time largely to showing that because Christ was lowly in his life, did not belong to the secular, either socially or politically; did not aspire to worldly power, was a peasant, a friend of publicans and sinners, and spent his life among the inglorious and the lowly, he was a disappointment to the world. But Mr. Jamieson pointed out that the story of the Saviour's life appeared more beautiful, his labor appeared more honorable, on account of his lowliness. It was wholly without ornament, martial prowess or ambition, it was one of hunger, pain and persecution, and death. Mr. Jamieson said such was the feeling of the world to Christ, and it was to be changed only as the nations mind and heart were changed. "Let us," he said, "take this despised Redeemer of the world. Let us glory in his humiliation. Let us know and point out that the same lowliness, because he is counted least of all, worthy of worship because deemed unworthy of worship."

Church, Westminster, delivered the address to the minister, and in doing so imparted much sound advice. He first congratulated the members and adherents of the church on securing as pastor a man of the first rank, a man of experience, a man of ability, a tried minister, a man who was no novice. While congratulating the church, Dr. McCrae also congratulated the community on securing such a citizen. Directing his remarks to Mr. Rollins, the speaker urged him to fully realize that he was an ambassador of God. "Look," said Dr. McCrae, "at the Saturday daily papers and you will see the announcement of silly, gossip topics for the pulpits on Sunday, topics that weaken and cheapen our pulpits, and we must wonder if the God represented in these pulpits is anything like the God of the Hebrew patriarchs."

"Don't preach silly sermons. Count no man your master. Esteem no man on earth as having a superior work to do. You are the highest office that God has committed to man. The high office makes you all the more a man. There are some men in the ministry who are great functionaries, but very small men. Be a man in and out of the pulpit. Do not give up your Christian work for the whim of any faddist. Expository preaching is the need of our congregation. Let us hear of the opening up of presenting to the people in easily understood and memorable form the treasure that God has given us in the Bible."

The minister, subject to a storm of whims and difficulties. I plead for a pulpit of deep convictions and profound thinking—genial teaching, earnest preaching, genial thinking. Do not be content with popular subjects. Politics—which would be a very big subject to preach on just now—social problems, and the like. Leave them alone. Keep the heart right."

ADDRESS TO CONGREGATION.

The address to the congregation was made by Rev. Dr. Drummond, of St. Thomas, whose remarks were of a very happy nature. Mr. Drummond offered congratulations to the people on having secured as pastor an old classmate of his own. He told the house that the college record of Mr. Rollins showed work faithfully and earnestly done, and this could be taken as an indication that the work at the King Street Church would also be of a high order. "In your kind," said Mr. Drummond, "was going to make a difference in every family. It was going to determine work for humanity in this world. It meant something to family life, and it was going to mean something to the religious life of the community. 'Co-operate to make the work tell in every home. If you want the best results given by Mr. Drummond to the people of the church. Practice the spirit of brotherhood; do not love one another for a short time in the week, say while you are in the church, but have a feeling of good will, a family feeling, at all times, that will tell in all your relationships. Be regular in your attendance. If you want the best results to be attained. Make attendance at the services a matter of duty, and not of convenience. Of course, the rain is a hindrance, but it is on any other day of the week, and the snow drifts pile up more fearfully, but attend the church just the same." Mr. Drummond spoke of the necessity of looking to the future, and he said he added that ministers had their blue days, got discouraged, and it would be a source of joy to them if the people would not and then tell them that their sermons had been a source of joy and help.

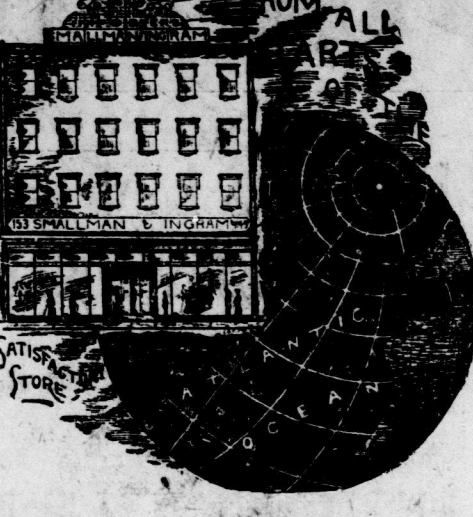

THE CUBAN TREATY

The U. S. Senate Ratifies It and Then Adjourns.

Washington, D. C., March 20.—After ratifying the Cuban reciprocity treaty the senate adjourned sine die today at 5:15 p.m. Practically the entire day was spent behind closed doors in executive session. Most of the time was devoted to consideration of the Cuban treaty. Several speeches were made in opposition to the treaty and one in favor of it, and then, promptly at the agreed hour, 3 o'clock, voting began. Roll calls were had on a number of amendments, and the treaty itself was made the subject of an aye and nay vote. The motion to ratify was adopted by a ballot of 50 to 45—some, more than a three-fourths vote, whereas only a two-thirds vote was necessary to secure a ratification.
