BESIEGE FEZ

SULTAN IS UNABLE TO ESCAPE

Spain Worried Over the Crisis Lest Some of the Foreign Powers Shall Intervene.

Madrid, Dec. 30. - A dispatch from Tangier, Morocco, today, announced that the rebels had cut the aqueduct which supplied Fez with water and added that the city was now practically without water. It was further asserted that unless the Kabyleh tribesmen from the south came to the succor of Fez the place must surrender within

The hostility against the Sultan is spreading to Fez. The Moors are exhibiting photographs of him arrayed in ridiculous garb. The Sultan yeserday assembled the nobles of the besieged town at the palace and exhorted them not to despair, assuring the chiefs that the imperial troops ultimately will triumph.

It is reported here that the Sultan of Morocco has been foiled in an attempt to break out of Fez, by the rebels investing the city. Foreigners in the interior of Morocco have been advised to make for the coast, as provisions are scarce and communications are almost closed.

The pretender himself is reported to be 20 miles from Fez. King Alfonso last night discussed the Morrocan crisis with Gen. Weyler, Minister of Wer, and Duke of Veragua, Minister Marine. In addition to the cruiser Infanta Isabel, which has al-Marine. ready gone to Tangier, other vessels are to hold in readiness at Malaga and Algeciras to take reinforcements
