

1,500 PIANO MAKERS OUT. New York, Sept. 25 .- The executive committee of the Piano and Organ Makers' Union, which is trying to enforce a demand for a nine-hour workday and 10 per cent advance in wages, has decided that the foremen must go on strike in all factories where strikes have been ordered. Some of the men who returned to work on getting only the nine-hour work day were ordered on strike again. In all 1,500 men were on strike last night, and about the number had gained their demands.

A STRIKE ENDED. Chicago, Sept. 25.-With a concession of 25 cents an hour in wages by the city, the strike of the Chicago sewer laborers is ended, and the 306 strikers went to work this morning. The city retains the right to discharge any of the men without being called to account by the union.
