MAXIMUM LIMIT PUT ON SALARIES

National Baseball Commission Takes Action Regarding Pay Rolls of Clubs.

New York, Jan. 10.—At today's session of the National Baseball Association, several constitutional changes were made and it was decided to hold the next annual meeting in New York on the third Tuesday in October of this year. With a view of regulating salaries and making them uniform in each league, at least to the extent of putting a limit upon them, an important amendment to the constitution was adopted. This provides for a maximum monthly salary limit for each club of the several leagues below class A. The classification is to be governed by population requirements and to be fixed by the respective leagues. A statement of maximum limit must be filed with the secretary of the board of arbitration immediately after the opening of the championship season in each of the leagues affected and it will be the duty of the national board to enforce it. The association took a stand like that of the major leagues with reference to post season games and amends its constitution to the extent that no club shall be permitted to participate in such games, except under the regulations of a board of control. The national board was given power to impose penalties for violations against this amendment. The board adopted a resolution putting all players who are ineligible to play in the association in the eligible list of the Tri-State League. Provision was made for the trial of players and umpires against whom charges may be made. An amendment was made to the constitution imposing a penalty of \$50 for invasion of territorial rights.

BOOKSELLERS AROUSED

A Protest Against Government Taking
Over Sale of School Books.

Toronto, Jan. 10.—The book sellers of Ontario will meet here on Jan. 15 to protest against any move on the part of the Ontario Government whereby the distribution of school books might be taken out of the hands of the book selling trade and administered by the Government.

The book sellers, who mean to wait upon the Government before it commits itself to this policy, will interview Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, at the school here at 11:30 a.m. on the date mentioned.

The objections of book sellers to Government distribution of school books are four-fold:

1. That the loss of revenue would cripple larger book stores and ruin the smaller ones.
2. That by striking such a blow at book stores the Government will deprive certain centers of necessary conveniences.
3. That it would have a deterrent effect upon private enterprise in the Province in general.
4. That it would involve the Government in a difficult and unprofitable enterprise.
