The main recommendations of the civil service commission are revolu- lous opposition will be shown. tionary. The overshadowing feature of its report is the proposal to place the system of appointments to the public service upon a new basis, which will eliminate party pull and patronage. The service, says the commission, should be entirely free from political favoritism or patronage, and appointments should only be made by merit, after competitive examination.

The machinery suggested for the new system is a permanent commission of three members to supervise examinations for candidates, to determine appointments, and to make periodical inspections of every department of government.

The commissioners are unsparing in denunciation of the methods of appointment to public office which have curse of the civil service." They allege that politics not only governs appointments, but promotions; that the absence of a system of promotions based on merit, and the inadequate scale of salaries, have discouraged younger officials; and that "the political element has steadily tended to deteriorate the public service." On this point the commissioners moralize as follows:

"Without going so far as to say that the official who has been apnot amenable to discipline, the commissioners have found in certain instances that officials appointed by remaining under its aegis have taken to themselves the idea that their services are altogether beyond the control of the higher officials: that. in fact, except in the matter of the disputed. observance of office hours, their country or their chief is of no consideration: that the annual increase will follow as a matter of course. they were disobedient. The com- brated firm of accountants, missioners agree that in the expansion that has occurred in Canada in arrivals do not actively respond to the regulations laid down for the government of the several departments. An official entering the public service should be made to understand fully that when he becomes an official any attempt to obtain or use political influence must be abandoned.

"As a rule the commissioners found in the outside service that politics enter into every appointment and that politicians on the spot interest themselves not only in the appointments, but in the subsequent promotions of the officers. While at Ottawa the departments generally are administered with a good consideration for the public interests. yet in the outside service the politics of the party is of greater importance in making appointments and promotions than the public interests of the Dominion, Promotion in that part of the service has become almost a nullity. In the outside service those who have a political pull use it for all it is worth. They pass by their superior officers, and bring pressure to bear to procure anything that may prove to their advantage. The examination is not an infallible exiterion of fitness. The candidate for public office who could make the highest number of marks in a written test might prove a misfit in his practical duties. WORK IN CANADA.

[Chicago Interior.] The larger cities of Canada, like those of the States, have had unusually large colonies of unemployed to care for this winter, but the prospects for the approaching outdoor working season are far from unencouraging. Over 50,000 men, it is said, will be employed upon railroad construction, alone.
