A SUDDEN DROP IN TOMATO PRICES

Opened at 35 Cents a Basket But Fell to 15 to 20 Cents in Short While.

BUTCHERS' MEAT SLOW

Oats Were in Strong Demand at \$1 60 to \$1 62-Hay Offerings Were Light-The Quotations.

The rapid drop in the price of tomatoes was the feature of this morning's market. The market opened strong with them selling at 35c a basket, but before an hour had passed they were decreasing rapidly in price and before the close they were wholesaling at 15 to 20 cents a basket. The crop in this vicinity is comparatively small so far, \$1 58. though the recent rains promise a very large crop at a little later date. But yesterday there were large shipments from outside places, which resulted in the phenominal drop noticed in this morning's market.

Farnham, Que., Aug. 16.—Eleven factories offered 400 boxes of butter and 50 boxes of cheese; 250 boxes of butter sold at 22½c; balance not sold, at 11 5-16c bid. yesterday there were large shipments morning's market.

Other Vegetables.

Other vegetables remained practical-1y unchanged in price. Pickling onions were offered in some quantities at 10 cents a quart, and found a ready sale. Large onions were

selling at \$1 a bushel. Peaches, plums, pears and dewberries were the chief fruits noticed in at 29c, 82 crates of prints at 28½c. the market. As yet there is very little change in the price of these commodities. Butter was in good demand, and the price was a little stronger. Crocks sold at 20 to 21 cents, while some of extra quality brought 22 cents.

Butchers' meats were again very slow in sale, and the amount offered state full cream, special, 14%c to 15%c; small or large colored or white, fancy, 12%c; state full cream, common to good, 11%c Meats and Grains. was small. There was little, if any, to 13 11%c.

Oats were in strong demand, a couple of loads of old oats selling at \$1 60 and \$1 62, respectively. Some $23\frac{1}{2}$ bads of new oats brought \$1 50.

London, Aug.17.-The Waddell Company, in the Colonial Dairy Produce Review, for the year ending June 30, say that Canadian butter on the whole is slowly improving in quality. The proportion of butter spotted with mold is very considerably reduced, owing to lower temperatures being maintained before being shipped, and also during the voyage. In the British markets fishiness is a very rare fault with Canadian butter.

Th main defect in Canadian butter, they say, is an acidity and taint, due to the cream not being delivered daily to the factories.

Regarding cheese, the cool-curing method adopted by Canada has undoubt-edly done much to improve its keeping quality, as well as to benefit the flavor, which should tend more and more to mildness. Unless very great care is exercised cheese will by and by be apt to become quite insipid. It is pleasant to be able to report that the Canadian cheese which has arrived this season since May 1, shows the greatest improvement in richness, flavor, texture and appear
