## QUASHES BIG FINE UNDER LIQUOR ACT

Judge Gauld at Hamilton Allows Appeal of Truckman Fined \$500.

### FINDS LAW NOT BROKEN

Declares Magistrate Mistaken As To Dates—Two "Dry" Acts Passed.

HAMILTON, May 1.—The appeal of Herbert T. Guess, truckman, against the conviction of Magistrate Jelfs on April 8, for unlawfully transporting liquor through the province of Ontario, was allowed by Judge Gauld today. Guess was fined \$500 by the police magistrate and costs. His honor found that there was no violation of international law and stated that the magistrate was mistaken in stating that the liquor transportation act, under which the prosecution was made, was passed before the Volstead act. His honor also stated that there was no evidence to show that the purchaser, the Buffalo Exporting Company, Charles Russell, secretary, concealed his identity and that his worship was mistaken in stating that Russell was a resident of Bridgeburg.

"In Rex vs. Campbell, on appeal from the two convictions of Police Magistrate Jelfs allowed the appeals and then stated my view was that the appellant was not called upon before accepting a consignment with the customs papers to make any investigations as to the legality or illegality of the sale of the goods he transports and that I should follow the decision of Chief Justice Meredith in Rex vs. Yarrow, 21, O. W. N., 338," Judge Gauld stated.

The Amelie Slave case of 1897, cited by the magistrate to support his contention that international law had been violated and similar cases are quoted by the judge to show that England had abolished the trade, but did not claim any right to enforce that prohibition against the subjects of those states which had not adopted the same opinion. Laws respecting piracy were also quoted together with several cases in the same light.

The whiskey in question here was not seized by the government in accordance with the principle laid down in Wheaton, at page 215, that "The General Consent of Nations, to extinguish the traffic, gives rise to the opinion that though once tolerated and even protected and encouraged by the laws of every maritime country, it ought henceforth to be considered as interdicted by the international code of Europe and America."

"The whiskey was, so far as Canadian laws and Ontario laws are concerned, being legally exported under the supervision of Canadian and provincial officers and, following the decision in Rex vs. Yarrow, I must allow the appeal and quash the conviction," the judgment concludes.

### NAB 25 COLORED MEN IN RAID ON WINDSOR CLUB

Police Lay Charges Under Liquor and Lord's Day Acts Against Prisoners.

WINDSOR, May 1.—Twenty-five were taken in a raid at the Border Cities' Social and Recreation Club (colored) on Brant street shortly before 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon. All were held by Windsor police for several hours on charges varying from a violation of the liquor law to breaches of the Lord's Day act. Two bottles of liquor were found, and a card game for stakes was in progress.

In police court today James Bowles, president, and Alfred Bell, vice-president, were charged with keeping a common gaming-house. They entered pleas of not guilty, and were remanded for trial one week under bail of \$50 each.

Of the 22 other members found at the club, the following four pleaded guilty to charges of gambling in violation of the Lord's Day act: Noble Lockman, Wilbert Turner, George Turner and Henry Stewart. They were fined \$5 and \$8 costs each.

### CLINTON RESIDENT DIES

John Harland, Hardware Merchant, 75 Years Old, Passes Away Suddenly.

CLINTON, May 1.—By the sudden death of John Harland, which occurred at his residence here this morning, Clinton loses one of its most highly-respected citizens and businessmen. Mr. Harland has been in the hardware business for over 50 years. He was in his 75th year, and was survived by his brother William, who was associated with him in business up to a few years ago, when he retired owing to ill-health. He leaves one son, Leonard, and two daughters, Amelia and Marion. Amelia being at present in California on a visit.

## RANEY REPLIES TO LETTER OF LEWIS

Tells Legislator Government Will Expect Substantiation of Charge Regarding Huston Case.

### PUBLIC LOOKS FOR PROOF

Attorney-General Withdraws Offer of Counsel to Represent Member at Inquiry.

TORONTO, May 1.—Attorney-General Raney, in reply to a letter from A. C. Lewis, M. L. A., in which the latter more or less disapproved of a commission to investigate the charges in connection with the death of Captain Orville Huston, calls upon Mr. Lewis to submit proofs of his charges to the commissioner.

Mr. Raney's letter expressed surprise that Mr. Lewis wrote that he did not feel himself "personally interested in the Huston case," and therefore, did not desire to avail himself of the government's offer to pay counsel to represent him at the inquiry.

Mr. Lewis also disapproved of a commission as not likely to discover any additional evidence regarding the manner of Huston's death.

The letter of the attorney-general continued: "Of course the government will not press upon you the offer to pay counsel to represent you at the inquiry, and in view of your refusal that offer is now withdrawn, but I cannot overlook your attitude towards the inquiry. Protected by your privilege as a member of the legislature, you launch charges of great gravity from your place in the house, and if I do not misunderstand you, you propose now to make no attempt to substantiate those charges, claiming that you are not personally interested."

After reminding Mr. Lewis of the charges made the attorney-general concludes:

"It will not do for you now to say that you are not personally interested. The public and the house will look to you to submit your proofs to the commission."

### VETERAN COURT OFFICIAL, WILLIAM SADLER, PASSES

Pallbearers at Funeral Will Be Members of Askin Street Sunday School Class.

The funeral of William Sadler, who passed away at his home, 45 Byron avenue, will be held Wednesday afternoon, Mr. Sadler was in his 77th year, having come to this country from England 65 years ago, locating at that time in Westminster, near Lambeth, on the farm now occupied by his son, A. K. Sadler. For a number of years he was engaged as a successful agriculturist, moving to London about a quarter of a century ago.

He was predeceased by his first wife 28 years ago, and is survived by his widow, Susan Sadler, three sons, A. K. Sadler, Lambeth; W. R. Sadler and G. A. Sadler of Detroit, and one daughter, Mrs. Walter Jordan of Revelstoke, B.C.

The pallbearers at the funeral will be all members of his Sunday school class at Askin Street Methodist Church, of which the deceased had been a consistent and active member for many years, the pastor of that church, Rev. J. T. Cosby Morris, conducting the services.

The late Mr. Sadler was particularly well known around the county court house and legal offices, having been county constable for more than 30 years. He was also one of the oldest members of the I. O. F. Lodge in Western Ontario.

### ACTS FOR GOVERNMENT

Gordon Waldron, K.C., to Probe Death of Captain Huston.

TORONTO, May 1.—Gordon Waldron, K.C., will be government counsel in the investigation into the death of Captain Orville Huston, which is to be conducted by John A. Macintosh, K.C.

This was announced by Attorney-General Raney this morning. He explained that the Huston family will be entitled to have counsel to represent it at least in regard to the second part of the proceedings, that which will investigate the inquest held immediately after Huston's body was found at Fort Francis.

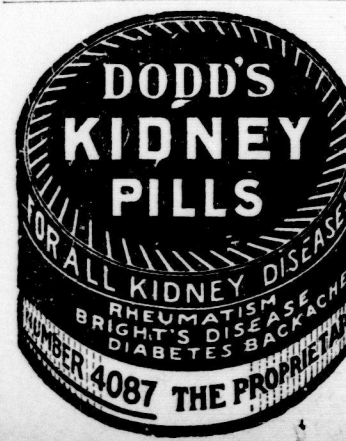
Mr. Raney, however, said he was not yet prepared to announce whether the government would pay for this counsel or not.

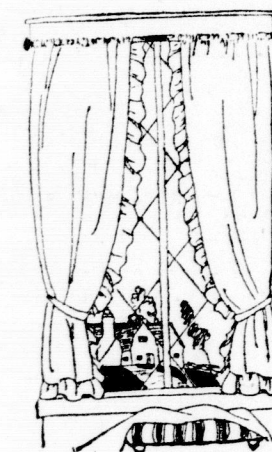

### WILL SUE SMALL ESTATE

TORONTO, May 1.—Thomas Flynn, of this city, who entered suit some time ago against the Capital Trust Company and Theresa Small, trustees of the estate of Ambrose J. Small, has been missing since city, who has been missing since December, 1919, to recover \$25,500, alleged to be due for services in connection with the sale by Small to Trans-Canada Theatres, Limited, of Small's theatrical interests for \$1,750,000, has a right to sue, so the appellate court has decided. Justice Middleton recently ruled that Flynn had no right to bring action against Small's trustees, but should enter proceedings against Ambrose Small himself.
