WILL CONFER ON FARM EDUCATION

Rural Interests Will Be Fully Discussed At Toronto Meeting.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—A two-day conference on agricultural education and extension work, which breaks entirely new ground in the wide field of rural interests, will be held in Toronto on Tuesday and Wednesday, under the auspices of the Provincial Agricultural College Alumni Association. The conference has been timed to take advantage of the presence in the city for the Winter Fair of many leaders in Canadian agricultural extension work. All farm and farm women's organizations in the province have been invited to take part. On Tuesday afternoon there will be opening addresses by the president, H. S. Fry, London, Ont.; Hon. M. W. Doherty, Ontario minister of agriculture, and Hon. R. H. Grant, Ontario minister of education. Specialized addresses will be the subject of addresses by President J. B. Reynolds and Miss Cruickshanks of Guelph, W. J. Bell, P. A. Carroll, Omar Turney and J. E. McCrosbie. The evening session will be devoted to general education in respect to rural life.

WOULD MAKE IT HARD TO MARRY

Winnipeg, Nov. 20.—"I want to make it hard to get married. We always shall have the poor with us so long as it is easy to get married—so long as people can go into the great adventure of life as they would go into a picture show," declared G. B. Clarke, secretary of the social welfare committee, in an address to the Winnipeg Ministerial Association, today. The likelihood of a request being made soon for legislation aimed at prevention of too early and unprepared marriages was foreshadowed by Mr. Clarke.

SAYS COLONIES SHOULD SHARE EAST BURDENS

P. W. Wilson States Britain Should Not Face Difficulties Alone.

FIRES STILL SMOLDERING

Toronto, Nov. 20.—That the burden of responsibility in connection with problems growing out of the Near East and other complications is heavier than Great Britain should be asked to bear alone, and that the self-governing overseas dominions can very well afford to take a generous view of what Britain does for the preservation of her ideals and traditions, was the opinion expressed today before the Canadian Club by Mr. P. Whitwell Wilson, former member of the British House and a newspaper man of wide experience. Mr. Wilson is a leading writer for the New York Times and also American representative of the London News. He has had an unusual opportunity of coming in contact with men of high office, of studying political subjects and of observing the drift of current events. Choosing "The Eastern Question" as his subject, he took occasion to give passing opinions upon the causes and results of the upheaval in British and United States elections. It was upon the expressed belief that Britain is standing as a buffer against the assaults of other races whose interests are different, that he based the remark as to the sympathy which should be shown by Canada and other dependencies.

Reviews History.

Giving a most enlightening resume of troubles which have centered around the Ottoman Empire for a century, Mr. Wilson dealt with recent history pertaining to Kemal's leadership of the Turks, of the part the French, British and Greeks had played in the changing scenes in the Near East and pointed out that now the fires of war and discord were still smoldering. It would take but a small breeze to fan them into anger. The events culminating in the temporary success of the Kemal forces and the burning of Smyrna, the speaker termed a tremendous tragedy. "So serious did the outlook at one time become," remarked Mr. Wilson, "that Mr. Lloyd George and his colleague, Mr. Chamberlain, sent out the fiery cross. It was not just the way to appeal to the great dominion governments, but whatever may be said of that it is at least worth while to know that the Turk was brought to his knees."

Waves Against Russia.

Passing on to the intrigues and ambitions of European and Asiatic powers, the speaker during his remarks made some trite statements, including these: "You are playing with fire when you arm the Turk." "Germany is always the brains of the Slav body. She is taking a great part in the reconstruction of Russia on what I may call a semi-capitalist line." "Never forget when you think of these Eastern problems, that Russia is still co-terminus with India. She may yet prove a terrible menace for the Turks and Russians are close together."

Drawing conclusions from what he saw going on, Mr. Wilson declared: "This business of war and destruction will never be solved till we have a higher ideal of international relations. Britain has great problems to constantly face and solve. She cannot act without being misunderstood. She cannot take an aggressive step without being suspected of personal motives and selfishness. The time has come, I think, when all who consider that they owe something to her for the civilization of today, to realize that she cannot always stand aside. A great deal, I think, does should appreciate and I think does appreciate the load which Britain is carrying. You can afford to be generous toward her when you know what she is doing to maintain the ideals and principles for which the Anglo-Saxon race stands."

EXPECT DEVELOPMENTS IN HAMILTON ROBBERY

Hamilton, Nov. 20.—Further developments in the robbery at the T. H. & B. Railway here on Saturday will take place within the next 24 hours, the police declared tonight, after the day investigating the theft of \$6,000 worth of jewelry contained in a traveler's sample case in the checkroom of the railway office by Gerald Hogan, representative of a firm of manufacturing jewelers.

The police story is to the effect that Mr. Hogan checked the case for the week-end, but he presented the check for the bag at 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, when the bag was discovered missing. One man was on duty at the time, and is unable to account for the disappearance of the bag.

Insurance of the case is held with Lloyds, London, England. Provincial, local and railway police are working on the case, also including representatives of the insurance company.

WOMAN CHARGED WITH THEFT AT WALLACEBURG

Special to The Advertiser. Wallaceburg, Nov. 20.—Ida Richardson, a young woman, hailing from Montreal, was this morning committed for trial on the charge of stealing \$50 from Andrew Rossetti.

The prisoner pleaded not guilty, and stated that the money was given her by Rossetti, whereas it was stated by a witness that the money was handed by the complainant to the prisoner for her to take care of for him. Upon returning from work one evening, the complainant found that the prisoner had gone away and his money also. She was arrested in Chatham.

GALLI CURCI PAYS HER FEDERAL INCOME TAX

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—While in Ottawa last week, Madame Galli Curci took advantage of her presence at the seat of the Canadian Government to settle her account with the federal income tax office.

It is understood that she paid a very substantial sum covering arrears of a previous concert tour in Canada.

R. W. Bradner, commissioner of taxation, stated that she was permitted to state the amount paid, and he was emphatic in stating that there was no question of seizure, the account being settled in quite regular form as a matter of course.

Madame Galli Curci's share of the receipts at the concert here amounted to nearly \$2,000.

CANINE ATTACKS INFANT PLAYMATE

Special to The Advertiser. Lion's Head, Nov. 20.—Left alone for a short time at her home Thursday night, Lillian, three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Thornley of Griffith's Island, began to play with a big dog, which became enraged, knocked the child down and attacked her.

Attracted by the screams of the little girl, her parents found her cruelly bitten and scratched about the arms and head.

The child was immediately taken to Big Bay and rushed by motor to the General and Marine Hospital, Owen Sound.

The dog was shot following the unfortunate affair.

URGE HOUSE RUSH IRISH BILL

Speech of King Expected To Deal With Important Foreign Affairs.

London, Nov. 20.—The king's speech at the formal opening of parliament on Thursday, it is understood, will begin with an important reference to foreign affairs, followed by an allusion to affairs at home as compared with the unsettled condition in Europe.

Legislation establishing the new constitution of Ireland, however, will be mentioned as the sole matter which necessitated the meeting of parliament for the second time this year, and the house will be invited to pass upon it without delay.

The universal view is that ten working days should suffice for the debate on the reply to the address from the throne and the passage of the Irish bill, but it is regarded as somewhat doubtful if the government's program for a very short program can be strictly adhered to.

Contrary to the usual experience after a general election, the opposition, as represented by the augmented number of members, is in high spirits over the reinforcement of its numbers, and is not likely to forego willingly the opportunities the debate will offer. An amendment raising the problem of unemployment and enabling Labor proposals on this subject, it is expected, will be pressed on the government, and other amendments may be moved, while the benches will be crowded with young members from the north eager to address the house on matters in which they are keenly interested.

Robert Smylie, president of the Scottish Movement Union, and secretary of his executive committee at Glasgow today that, although Labor is now about 150 strong, they must not expect a million in the next few months, but they might look for a vast improvement in the conditions of the workers.

The two Liberal parties will also be active, and it may be necessary to offer special days for the debate after the Labor party is transacted. Asked whether Newbold, the solitary Communist in the new parliament, would take the oath of allegiance to the king, the Communist party's parliamentary secretary admitted that the oath did not accord with the principles of the party, but added that "as a matter of expediency" no practical difficulty was anticipated.

THIEVES CARRY OFF CLOTHES AND CASH

Gents' Furnishing Store At Preston Broken Into Sunday Morning.

Special to The Advertiser. Galt, Nov. 20.—Early Sunday morning thieves gained an entrance to R. A. Holden's gents' furnishing store in Preston by breaking a cellar window, taking several overcoats, a couple of suits and some change in the till. The safe, the floor of which was left open, was ransacked, but nothing taken. On the previous Friday night the Cumming garage was broken into, \$4.80 taken from the cash drawer and two auto tubes were also missing.

After spending the whole day on the assumption that the cause of this morning's raid was the theft of the safe, the police, after a search of the premises, were disappointed. Ottawa, Nov. 20.—(By Canadian Press).—Canada will participate in the British Empire Exhibition to be held at Wembley Park, near London, in 1924, and will have a pavilion covering approximately 150,000 square feet of space.

Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, in his interview this afternoon with Major E. A. Belcher, assistant general manager of the exhibition and head of the mission which has toured the provinces and placed the matter of participation before the various governments.

The amount of money which it is proposed to spend of the Canadian exhibit for the occasion was not stated. The space being taken, however, is the same as that being taken by Australia, which is spending \$1,250,000 on its display of Australian products for the exhibition.

Major Belcher expressed satisfaction with the result of his tour of Canada.

LIBERAL MEMBER IS RETURNED UNOPPOSED
Ottawa, Nov. 20.—The return of John G. Robichaud as Liberal member for Gloucester, N.B., by acclamation, was announced in a message received at the prime minister's office shortly after the close of nominations today.

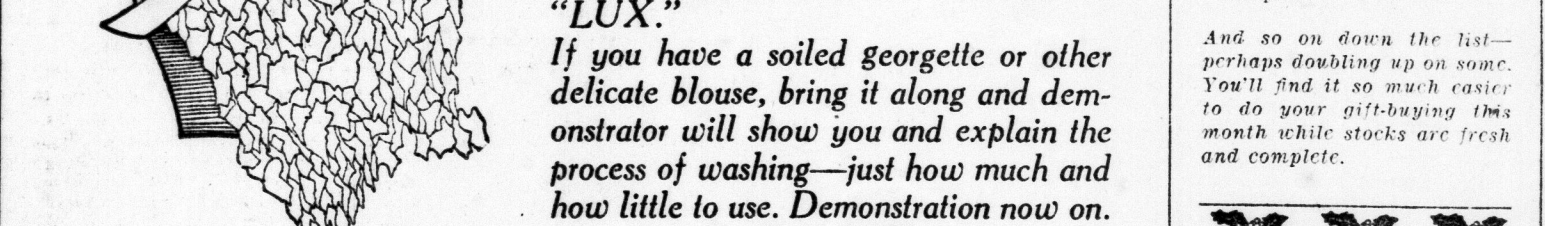

WILL BE STRAIGHT FIGHT IN LANARK

David Finlay, Liberal, and Dr. Preston, Conservative, To Contest Riding.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—(By Canadian Press).—As a result of today's official nominations for candidates to fill the five vacant federal constituencies there will be only two election contests. As forecasted, Liberal candidates in the constituencies of Megantic and Jacques Cartier, Que., and Gloucester, N. B., were acclaimed. Eugene Roberge of Laurierville is the member for Megantic. Theodule Rheumeau will represent Jacques Cartier, and John G. Robichaud is member for Gloucester. These constituencies were all represented by Liberals in the last parliament.

In Lanark, Ont., there is a straight fight between Dr. R. F. Preston, Conservative, and David Finlay, Liberal. Both candidates live in Carleton Place. The contest in Halifax is a three-cornered one, with no Conservative in the field. Hon. R. E. Finn, minister without portfolio in the Nova Scotia government and official candidate of the Liberal party, is opposed by John J. Powers, K.C., running as an Independent Liberal, and James O'Connell, representing labor. Mr. Finn has been member for Halifax in the Nova Scotia Legislature since 1906.

RECOVER BODIES FROM LAKE WITH DYNAMITE

Quebec, Nov. 20.—The bodies of nine victims of the recent drowning in Lake St. Lawrence, near Shelter Bay, have been recovered, it was announced last night by the Ontario Pulp and Paper Company. Donat Therrien, who was driving the motor boat which sank, is the only one who has not been located. Dynamite was used by the searchers to recover the bodies.

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Whiskey Bottles Floating in Lake Erie Eagerly Sought by Norfolk Residents

Special to The Advertiser. Simcoe, Nov. 20.—Reminiscent of pre-prohibition days is the scene today at the cove five miles west of Port Rowan, where the steamer City of Dresden, laden with 500 cases of Canadian whiskey, foundered about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The heavily-laden ship, with Captain J. S. McQueen of Amherstburg in command, bound from Port Huron, was caught in the sweeping gale which threw Lake Erie into a fury on Friday and Saturday. The boat sprang a leak and the water poured in so fast, all hope of reaching Port Burwell was abandoned, and Captain

McQueen headed the vessel for shore. The treacherous undercurrent consistently swept the boat back although several times she was but 300 yards distant. A small lifeboat was launched with oars and lifebelts, but the heavy seas capized it. The second skiff was lowered minus oars and belts and the captain and four mates clambered in. The captain's son, Percival McQueen, aged 21, while assisting one of the men who was rendered partially helpless by a wooden leg, slipped, was caught on the crest of a huge breaker and was seen no more.

The five survivors managed to reach the beach in safety after a battle with the furious waves. Exhausted, they were carried to the nearby home of Dell Rokey, and are still in a battered condition. The vessel is fast disintegrating, and hundreds of quart bottles are being eagerly captured by residents of the neighborhood. Whole cases are being loaded into waiting automobiles and conveyed to unknown destinations. The boat has listed to one side, but should the wind turn to the north will probably right itself. Meanwhile the cabin, intact, has been carried on to the beach.

The City of Dresden was condemned some 20 years ago when Captain McQueen purchased it and installed a completely new set of high-powered engines. Young McQueen's body has not been found.

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
