The total amount contributed by the city for roadwork in 1924, including the present bill, is \$27,435.37, but the item for construction in the suburban area for 1924 is less than that of 1923. The amount when the bill amounted to \$17,787.87.

U. S. FARM OUTLOOK FAIRLY ENCOURAGING

Department of Agriculture
Warns Farmers Against Increasing Wheat Acreage.

Washington, D.C., Feb. 1.—The general outlook for United States agriculture this year is "fairly encouraging," compared with recent years, the department of agriculture declared in its annual outlook report, made public today, but it added that the "may be a slackening in domestic demand for farm products next winter."

Producers of the major farm crops, such as cotton and wheat, were advised to follow "about the same program of production as last year."

"Increased acreages of these crops," it said, "are not advisable this year."

"If there is an average crop of wheat in 1925," the outlook report continued, "the present high price of wheat cannot be expected to prevail for the 1925 crop, although prices are expected to be better than in 1924."

Grover of hard spring wheat are cautioned not to increase production above domestic requirements.

ATTITUDE OF MEXICO DISPLEASES BRITISH

England Dissatisfied With
Question of Property Confiscation.

London, Jan. 31.—Despite the repeated declaration of Aguero, Mexican secretary of foreign relations, that Mexico has spoken its last word concerning that country's relations with Great Britain, the foreign office stated last night that the next move was still up to Mexico.

It was contended that Mexico had not satisfied Great Britain on the question of British subjects' property including that of Mrs. Rosalie Evans, who was murdered last year, and others who it was claimed, have suffered losses at the hands of the Mexicans.

In the senior division, shields will be presented to the winners in each of the five classes which will be given prizes also.

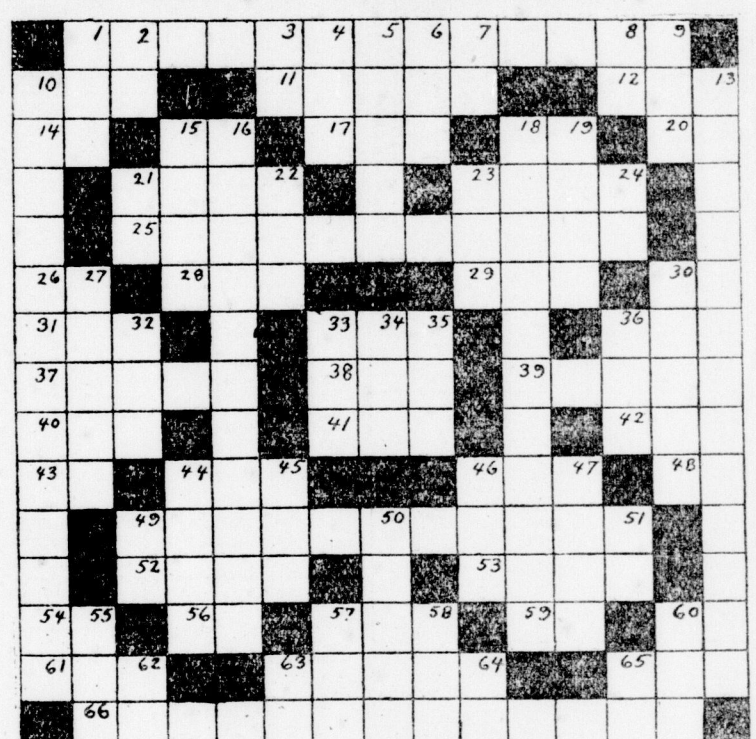
