

BRITAIN APPROVES AIR DEFENCE PLAN

House of Commons Allows
Huge Expenditures For
Protective Means.

Associated Press Despatch.
London, Feb. 26.—The House of Commons tonight passed the air estimates presented by Sir Samuel Hoare, the air secretary, and involving an expenditure of £21,319,300.

The secretary declared that a system of air defence would probably be established so as to make the risk of attacking Great Britain a very consideration in the minds of any country thinking of doing so.

Answering the attacks of Laborite extremists he asserted that the government was just as anxious for a reduction of armaments as they. The prime minister had authorized him to say that the government would take the first opportunity, whether by conference or by other means which could be suggested, to effect a reduction, which he believed every member of the House desired.

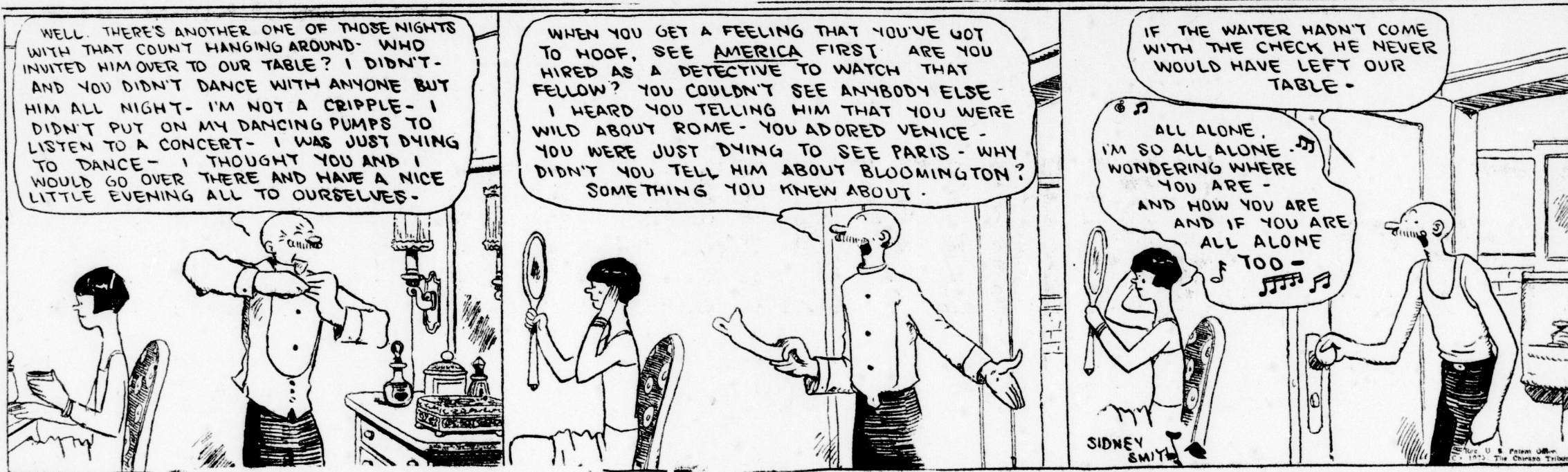

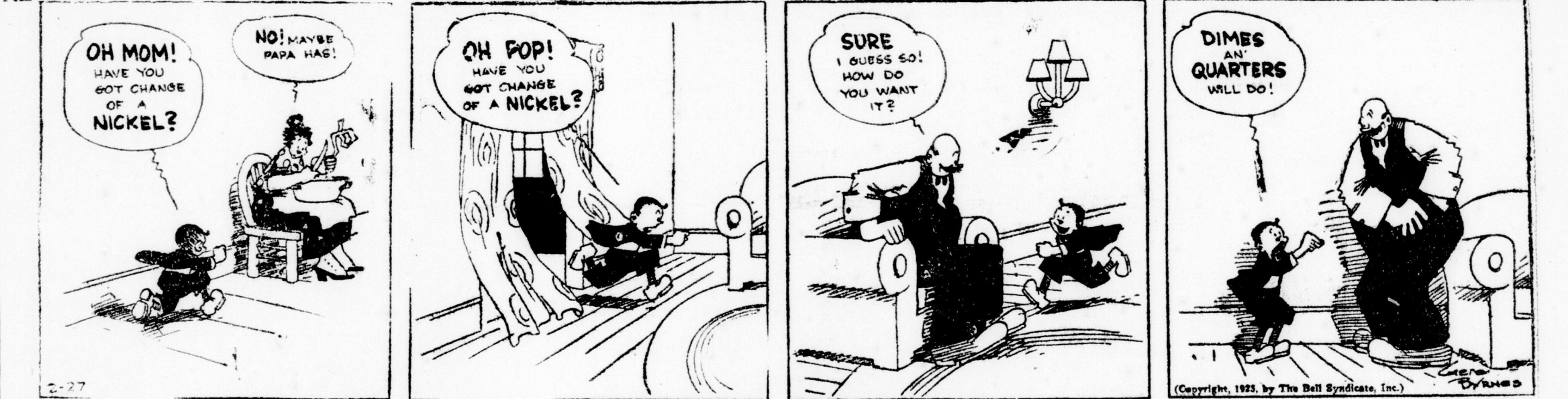

FRENCH RAISE COST OF IDENTITY CARDS

All Foreign Visitors Remaining
More Than Two Weeks
Are Affected.

Paris, Feb. 26.—The Chamber of Deputies has adopted the article in the revenue bill raising the fee for an identity card, which all foreign visitors intending to stay in France more than a fortnight must obtain within 48 hours of their arrival, from 10 francs to 60, plus supplementary taxes of eight and four francs for the department and city of issue, respectively, making a charge of 72 francs in all.

The cards are valid for three years, when they must be renewed, and the fee for renewal is fixed at 200 francs, the object being to distinguish between mere tourists and more or less permanent residents who, it is felt, ought to be asked to make a contribution to the French revenue over and above the ordinary taxes, since neither they nor their children are liable to military service.

Exception is made in the cases of foreign students and workmen, for whom the fee is fixed at 10 francs, either for issuance of the card or renewal.

It is estimated that this tax on foreigners will yield 200,000,000 to 300,000,000 francs annually.
