The next House and architect. Editor World: In the debate on the proposed parliament buildings in the local legislature on the 23rd March, Mr. Fraser said "the competition had already failed, although he had been told they would bring forth the best efforts of our own architects."

The competition for designs for the court house had also failed. And I am driven to the inevitable conclusion that the architects who were invited to compete have been robbing by scant courtesy and scantier justice at the hands of the local legislature as well as of the court house committee. It certainly does not seem only most unfair, but entirely improper that as respects the parliament buildings the competition should have been limited to the cost of \$500,000, a sum manifestly inadequate that then an American expert should be invited to compete and award upon the designs, and on his reporting that none of them were suitable for the purpose, his own report should be the basis of the selection of the plan and superintendence of the construction should be in his hands without competition and without the right to be heard.

Mr. Fraser, the American architect, who is thus favored may be both honest and competent, but it is a position not to be desired by any architect, and it is a position which should be avoided by the local legislature. The explanation of his action is found in the fact that in carrying out the scheme his client is enabled to obtain the best of both worlds.
