DEATH OF THE WORLD CHAMPION SCULDER LAST NIGHT.

HE PASSED AWAY PEACEFULLY—O'Connor

Called his sorrow—The Australian Phenomenal Record—A Complete History of the Man—About the Future

Championship Race

Adelaide, South Australia, Dec. 9.—Henry Ernest Seale, the champion sculler of the world, died of typhoid fever to-night.

The whole country is in mourning over the sad event. Flags are at half-mast and the weid tones of the St. Paul's chapel bell disturb the stillness of the night. For a time it was hoped that a recovery was being made, but a week ago the great sculler took a relapse and has been slowly sinking day by day. His end was a peaceful one and he now rests calmly on his own with a title that can never be wrested from his honored name.

Among the many cablegrams from friends throughout the world one was received from his late opponent, William O'Connor, from Toronto, Canada, expressing his sympathy and hope for recovery.

Typhoid Fever Grew in England. It seems only yesterday that the news of Seale's great victory over our own champion O'Connor was spread over this city like wildfire a few minutes after the great race on Sept. 9. Then the doughy Australian was a human paragon with the great strength and skill to wrest the victory from the hitherto unconquerable Canadian. To-day Seale is dead and his death is the loss of one of the many of human life. OUR CITY COUNCIL WOULD LIKE TO

SEE THE WORLD'S FAIR THERE

And Pass a Resolution to That Effect—

Will be a Miscellaneous Budget Com-

mittee—Recommendations Struck Out.

At the meeting of the City Council last

night, Ald. Dodds, seconded by Ald. Gillette,

secured the passage of a resolution expressing
