TO DOOM CANADA AS A FIELD FOR BRITISH CAPITAL.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 21.—At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce to-day Sir George Madon-Powell, M.P., said that the new United States tariff was a great impediment to Canadian industries. He thought Canada was in developing her overseas trade. In speaking of her valuable natural resources he said that Canada had many opportunities for the investment of British capital because he believed there would not be the same financial vagaries there as characterized American government and legislation.

LEAPED INTO THE SEA OF WEEDS. Sensational Suicide on Shipboard.—Eaten By a Shark.

PLYMOUTH, Nov. 21.—The steamer Lusitania arrived from Australia yesterday. The captain reports that while the vessel was passing through the Red Sea a beautiful young English girl, Miss McKnight, who took passage at Melbourne and was coming to England to be married, jumped overboard. She was depressed in spirits and would not regard that she had contracted leprosy. On the night of Nov. 3 Miss McKnight suddenly leaped from the deck into the sea, and the passengers and crew were thrown into confusion. The vessel was at sea and the captain was unable to see the girl. It is supposed that she was eaten by a shark.

Accommodation for Patients. Health, Nov. 21.—The municipal authorities have allotted temporarily to Prof. Koch five buildings in the Moabit suburb of Berlin for the purpose of aiding him in carrying on his experiments looking for the discovery of a cure of infectious diseases, such as scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria and typhus fever. Prof. Koch will also carry on his investigations in the hospital and clinic of cancer in these buildings. There will be accommodation for 40 patients in the temporary hospital. The professor considers that his labors in connection with tuberculosis are finished.
