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TRUCKLERS AND TRAITORS

ARE THE IRISH MEN WHO AGREE WITH ROSSBERY. They should be driven out of Public Life, says the Irish National League.

LONDON, March 20.—The Irish National League of Great Britain has issued a manifesto to the Irish people concerning Lord Rossbery's explanation of his attitude towards Home Rule.

The manifesto declares that the explanation is insufficient and that Irish men, trucklers, cowards and traitors who ought to be driven out of public life.

WHAT IS AN ACCIDENT? Suppose a Man is Attacked by Heart Disease While in Swimming?

NEW YORK, March 20.—The trial of a suit against the United States Mutual Accident Association to recover \$10,000 on an accident policy will be begun to-day in Part II of the Superior Court.

The plaintiff, John J. Walsh, of the body was found floating in the sea near Rockaway on Sept. 4, 1913.

A coroner's jury said his death was due to accidental drowning while bathing. The insurance company refused to pay the \$10,000 policy on the ground that death was not heart disease, and as it was consequently not a result of an accident it was not covered by the policy.

IMPRISONED AND FINED. Solid Sentences on Men Who Defrauded the Italian Government.

ROME, March 20.—Signor Chauve, manager of the Popolo Romano newspaper, and Signor Gallina, formerly an inspector in the Customs service, who were recently tried for defrauding the Government of 225,000 lire, were sentenced to four years and imprisoned for four years and subsequently to be excluded from public office for four years more and also pay a fine of 5000 lire.

Gallina is to be imprisoned for two years and fined 10,000 lire, to be excluded from public office for three years more and to pay a fine of 4000 lire.

Two other men implicated in the frauds received similar sentences and two were acquitted.

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THE TARIFF BILL REPORTED.

Discussion in the Senate Committee on Finance was reported in the Senate today and was ordered to be printed and placed on the calendar.

Mr. Voorhees (Dem. Ind.), who made the report, gave notice that he would ask the Senate to take the consideration of the bill on Monday, the 2nd of April, and said that he would then be prepared to make a statement in relation to it.

Mr. Morrill (Rep. Vermont) stated that the Republican members of the committee had not objected to the report, but that they were opposed to the change from specific to ad valorem duties.

A Democratic member of the committee, Mr. McPherson of New Jersey, indicated also his opposition to the income tax and the provisions as to the mode of imposing duties on sugar, the bill having it optional with the customs officials whether the duties be fixed by the police or set by the Dutch tariff.

Section 53, regulating the internal tax on cigars and cigarettes, has had struck from it all changes made in that tax and the McKinley law, has been stricken from the bill and such parts of that act (notably the tobacco tax) are retained under a proper section.

Revising the Anti-Option Bill. 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LITERALLY DECAYING ALIVE.

STRANGE MALADY WHICH HAS ATTACKED A YOUNG GIRL. First Her Thumb Turned Black and Was Amputated—All the Fingers Followed.

BALTIMORE, March 20.—The physicians of City Hospital are puzzled over a strange case which came under their notice two weeks ago. Nothing like it has been seen here, nor is there a record in medical history of a similar case.

The patient is a young woman from Washington County, Pa. She has some peculiar ailment, almost like leprosy, and is literally decaying alive.

Several years ago a small sore appeared on the thumb of her right hand and after a few days it became black as ink.

Amputation of the thumb was resorted to in order to save her life and for a time she was comparatively well. In a few months a finger became sore as the thumb had done, and it, too, was amputated.

Next her hand also became afflicted and it was taken off as the others. The forearm was attacked by the strange malady and it was amputated at the elbow.

A few months after the stump of the arm turned black and was taken off at the shoulder. Now her left hand and feet are turning dark and she has been sent to the hospital in hopes that her life may be saved.

MURDER BY SCALDING. The Deed of a Demon in "Hell's Kitchen." NEW YORK, March 20.—Sue Martin, aged 11, of 615 West 125th street, disappeared from home on Monday.

To-day her mutilated body was found hidden in the cellar of a tenement at 517 West 20th street, in the locality known as "Hell's Kitchen."

The body had evidently been scalded in boiling water, the flesh was removed from her back and a few hunting parties will be made by the railroad.

The murder was evidently committed to hide another crime no less revolting.

TEN YEARS FOR MURDER. The Participants in the Mrs. Tragedy Receive Their Sentences.

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THAT BAD MAN FROM THE WEST

THE INDIAN EMPIRE DOOMED. UNLESS THE NAIVES CAN BE AWED BY THE ARMY.

General Lord Roberts Says the Army Needs Strengthening More Than the Navy—Russian Aggression on the Indian Frontier—Protection Has Hindered the Growth of India.

LONDON, March 20.—General Lord Roberts, ex-commander-in-chief of Her Majesty's forces in India, was the guest of the city of Newcastle to-day. In a speech acknowledging the freedom of the city Lord Roberts took occasion to express his views upon certain aspects of the Indian Government and his views on Indian affairs.

He deplored the fact that protection was hindering the growth of commerce with India, but it was a fact, nevertheless.

He thought it was a great deal more necessary to strengthen the army than to augment the navy, though he thought both needed strengthening. There was nothing the navy could do, he said, to prevent Russian aggression in Afghanistan, but the army could do something. Unless the natives of the east were over-awed by an effective army they would be the Indian empire was doomed.

AUSTRALIA AND THE CABLE. She is Willing to Stand One-Third of the Cost.

LONDON, March 20.—The United Empire Trade League entertained at luncheon to-day Sir Thomas McIlwain, Hon. Robert Lowe and Sir Charles Zupper.

The speeches showed that the Australasian colonies were united strongly with Great Britain in opposing the Government's proposal to give aid in the way of subsidies to the proposed Atlantic and Pacific steamship routes, and the Pacific cable, with much prospect of success under the Rosebery regime.

Mr. Robert Reid said regarding the cable scheme that Australia was prepared to contribute one-third of the cost either as a guarantee of interest or as principal. A New English Cardinal. LONDON, March 20.—The Daily Chronicle has announced that the late Cardinal, who was the most prominent candidate for the post of Archbishop of Canterbury, has been elected to that office.
