HEAVY SENTENCE ON THE MAN WHO SHOT CONDUCTOR TURNER.

Taken from the Central Prison in the Morning After Serving One Term, and a Few Hours Later Given a Sentence of Twenty Years in Kingston Penitentiary.

James Troy, a well-known burglar and crook, was sentenced at the St. Catha-rines Assizes on Saturday to 20 years in the penitentiary for shooting Conductor Turner of the Grand Trunk on June 10

Turner of the Grand Trunk on June 10 last. On June 10 last the train crew of a Grand Trunk freight discovered a party, of five tramps reposing peacefully in a box car. Near the little village of Jor dan the passengers were disembarked. They objected to being disturbed and one drew. a revolver and shot Conductor Tur-ner, seriously wounding him. The gang was captured, but when arraigned there was no proof as to which one had fired the shot and the five were sent to the Contral Prison four months on a charge of trespass. Evidence was discov-ered which pointed to Troy as the guilty party. On Saturday he was taken by Government Detective Greer from the Central to St. Catharines. He was found guilty and sentenced to 20 years in the penitentiary.

GREAT INFLUX OF PRISONERS. 100 More Convicts in Central Prison Than U-ual at This Time.

U all at This Time. No fewer than 394 convicts are at the present time in the Central Prison repent-ing their past misdeeds, while they board at the expense of the inoffensive public. This number represents an increase of over 100 as compared with September last year, and is fully up to the winter season average. The increase is in all probability due to the fact that instead of sending weary wanderers to jail for short terms, as in former years, the magistrates in the vari-ous counties are sentencing them to terms in the Central Prison.

MAY TAX QUEBEO LUMBER. Because That Province Charges Stumpage

Washington, Sept. 15.—In view of the United Press despatch from Canada stat-ing that the Province of Quebec imposes a stumpage tax on spruce logs, the Treas-ury Department requested the State De-partment to make an official investiga-tion of the fact in order that the Treas-ury Department may carry out the pro-visions of the new tariff as concerns lum-ber. If it should be found that the Pro-visione of Quebec is continuing to levy this stumpage tax, then the duties imposed under the McKinley law will be exacted on lumber coming from that province into the United States.
