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COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Street Railway stocks were in de-

mand yesterday, and the highest prices

for some time were recorded. Mon-

teal Street Railway sold at 200, and

closed at 208 1/2, while Toronto sold

at 190 1/2 in Montreal, and 192 1/2

here, closing at 191 1/2. Montreal Gas

was very active, selling up to 207

and closing at 208.

Sterling exchange continues very

strong, and gold shipments are pre-

dicted at New York for Saturday.

These are a menace to the stock mar-

ket, and good authorities predict fur-

ther liquidation.

There is a good shipping demand for

both hay and straw, and prices are

usually firm. Sales of baled hay are

reported at \$14.25 to \$14.50 on track,

and of straw at \$7.50 to \$7.75. The

former is \$5 to \$5.50 a ton higher than

a year ago and straw \$2.50 higher.

The custom house computes the
