London, Nov. 14.—Operators on the took Exchange were busied to-day in concluding the fortnightly settlement. The dealings were limited. Most departments closed steady, and confidence is increasing. Only one failure was reported during the day, against several that were expected to occur.

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Street Railway stocks were in demand yesterday, and the highest prices for some time were recorded. Montreal Street Railway sold at 209, and closed at 208 1-2, while Toronto sold as high as 80 3-4 in Montreal, and 80 1-2 here, closing at 80 1-3; Montreal Gas was very active, selling up to 207 and closing at 206.

Sterling exchange continues very strong, and gold shipments are predicted at New York for Saturday. These are a menace to the stock market, and good authorities predict further liquidation.

There is a good shipping demand for both hay and straw, and prices are unusually firm. Sales of baled hay are reported at \$14.25 to \$14.50 on track, and of straw at \$7.50 to \$7.75. The former is \$5 to \$5.50 a ton higher than a year ago and straw \$2.50 higher.
