

Canada needed more immigrants, he said. How was this country going to cope with its railway problem if the population did not increase speedily?
The president of the C. P. R. had spoken wisely in advocating encouragement of immigration. If the artisan immigrant was discouraged for two or three years his tendency would be to go somewhere else and leave Canada to herself. 

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
