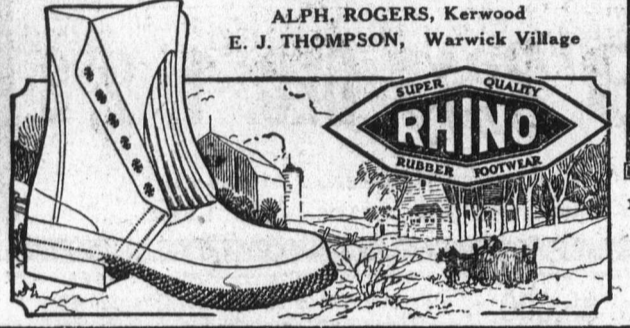

British Merger of Wide Scope to be Rival of Standard Oil

Huge Trust Under Organization Will Hold Rich Reserves in Many Lands—Company Will be a Fusion of Royal Dutch and Shell Groups with Anglo-Persian and Burma Oil Companies.

Paris, November 17.—An oil trust under British control rivaling the Standard Oil in financial strength and world-wide scope is reported in French financial circles.

The Royal Dutch Company is to pass entirely into the control of British financiers with Dutch consent, according to my information, and the British Government will relinquish its share in the Anglo-Persian Company.

The first steps toward formation of the trust were commenced during Ramsay MacDonald's administration, and under Premier Baldwin are expected to reach rapid completion.

The Trust will be a fusion of the Royal Dutch and Shell Groups with the Anglo-Persian and Burma Companies. The Royal Dutch stockholders will have a 46 per cent interest in the new trust; the Shell 32 per cent, the others, 22 per cent.

The former Dutch control of the Royal Dutch Company has already been transferred to British hands, according to this information.

The new Trust will have rich oil reserves in Persia, India, the Dutch Indies, Venezuela, Peru, Trinidad and Roumania, as well as whatever interest can be maintained in the Mosul oil fields, which lie in that portion of Iraq, the Arabian kingdom between the Tigris and Euphrates Rivers which is claimed by both British and Turks.

The British hold a League of Nations mandate over Iraq, formerly Mesopotamia, but the northern boundary is in dispute. The League of Nations is mediating.

The United States and Mexico are still the biggest producers of oil, but the oil fields of the new Trust are capable of producing 45 per cent of the world's output, it is said.

The Burma Oil Company, which has a first option on the British Government's stock in the Anglo-Persian Company, is said to be the prime mover in the combine. The Anglo-Persian is still offering objections.

The largest freight car to enter the local C.N.R. yards has arrived here with a consignment of flax tow from Wisconsin, billed to Howard Fraleigh, the Forest flax man. The car was too large to be brought through the tunnel at Sarnia and had to cross the border at Windsor. It is 14 feet high, 10 feet wide, 51 feet long and carried 40 tons of tow, while an ordinary car is 8 feet high, 8 feet wide, 36 feet long and holds 10 tons of flax tow.

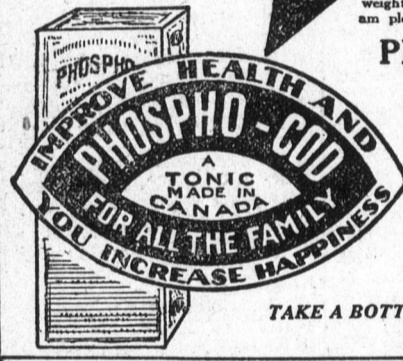

London-Sarnia Road Pavement is Urged

Department of Highways is Asked to
Do Work Next Year

Sarnia, Nov. 17.—The paving of the Sarnia-London highway will be completed next year if a movement now taking shape is successful. Representations are being made to the minister of provincial highways, stressing the importance of this work and it is felt that if the entire paving is not done in 1925, a large portion of it at least will be completed. The provincial highway department will be urged to have the necessary appropriations passed and the materials brought in this winter, so that an early start may be made in the spring.

In this connection it is pointed out that the London-Sarnia highway has been very popular with tourists from the United States during the past season. This is due largely to the fact that the main roads leading out of Port Huron are paved for long distances. If the section between London and Sarnia was all paved it would be the means of attracting a larger number of tourists annually it is stated.

SARNIA

This afternoon the charge against Harry Loughhead of selling liquor on October 6 was dismissed by Magistrate Gorman in city police court. Trial of a similar charge on another date, Oct. 4 was commenced and adjourned. Loughhead is the proprietor of one of the river-beer scows, and he was alleged to have sold beer to special officers from Toronto.

Yesterday and today great flocks of wild geese and duck passed along the shore of Lake Huron, and the air was filled with honks and calls as they formed in line for the sunny south. Sarnia sportsmen were out armed with the latest in guns, but no bags were reported as the birds were flying too high. Hunters and naturalists say the geese and duck are about ten days later this year than last in making their southern excursion.
