LARGE WOOL CROP IN NOVA SCOTIA

Truro.—The bulk of Nova Scotia's wool crop will go to Ontario this year. R. Forbes & Company, at Hespeler, are taking the largest amount. The rest of the crop which is being shipped will go to different firms. There is still in the warehouse at Truro twenty thousand pounds which has not yet been sold.

Besides the forty thousand pounds graded here, there was about forty-five thousand pounds graded at Antigonish which will all go to the Upper Provinces.

This makes the Nova Scotia wool crop over eighty thousand pounds, which is the largest in recent years. This being about twenty thousand pounds more than the combined crop of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. As yet the prices which the farmers will receive are not known, but it is believed that they will be well above the average price of twenty-two cents per pound, which was received last year. This wool was all graded for the Nova Scotia Sheep Breeders' Association under the co-operative grading and marketing scheme.

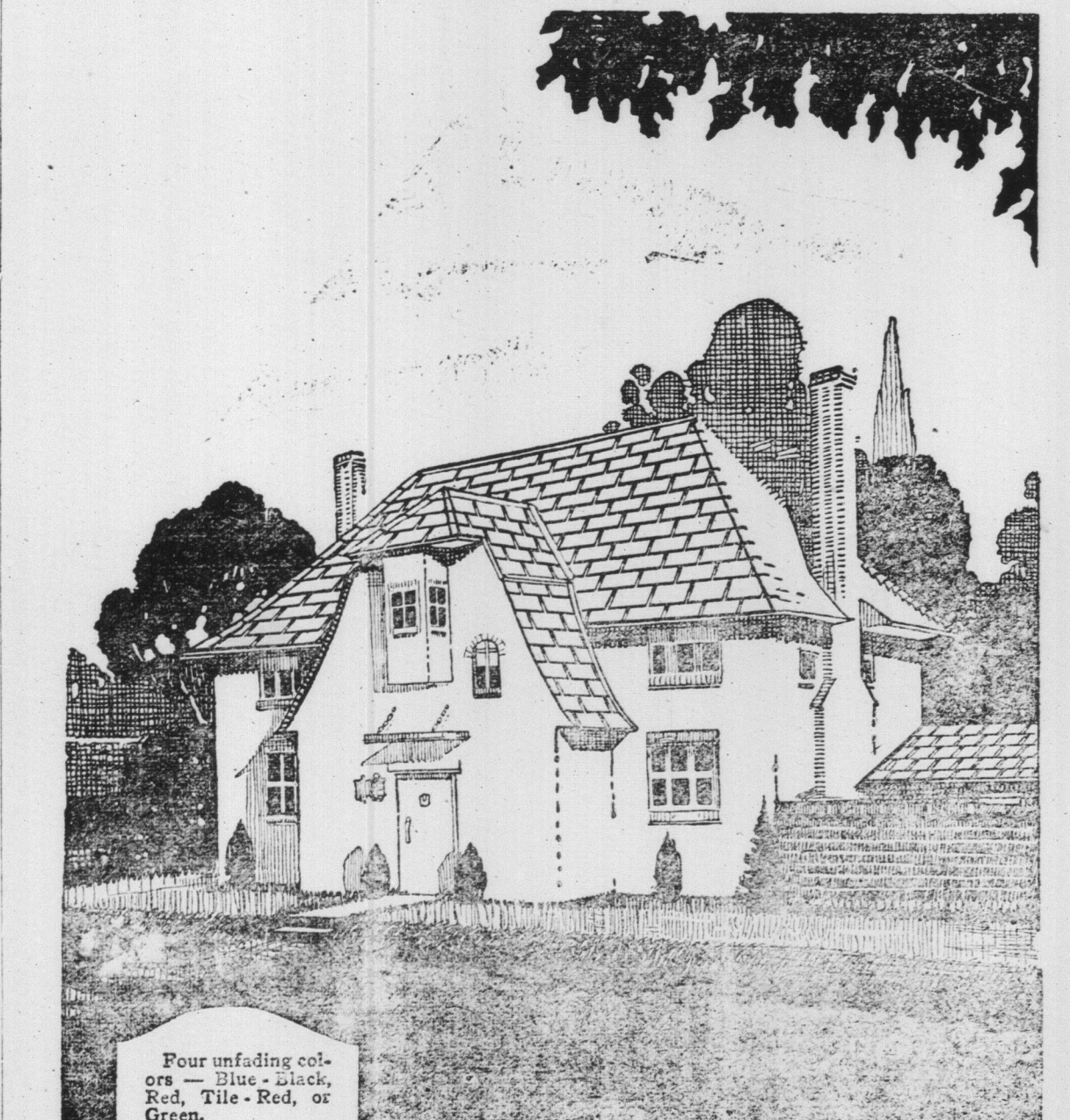
has been idle for the Summer months is to begin its activities again. The ladies are invited to tea at the home of its President, Mrs. Harold Mason, on August 24th.
