NATURALISTS' PORTFOLIO.

WONDERS OF THE SEA.—Who can tell of all the
 wondrous things that live in the sea? In the Indian
 Ocean, many feet below the surface of the water,
 grow woods quite as luxuriant as any jungles or
 thickets we read of in South America. Some of the
 trees grow as high as two houses piled one on other.
 They are called by a hard name—neracysten.
 The roots resemble coral, and from the slender stem
 grows a cluster of very long leaves. Other trees
 grow almost as high and end in one single huge leaf
 of enormous size.

EFFECT OF POISON ON ANIMALS.—A French doctor has
 recently called attention to the fact that hemlock
 seed is eaten by mice without apparently producing
 fatal effects on them. He has recently succeeded in
 supporting two mice for eight days on hemlock
 seed. They ate it at first with repugnance and even
 seemed to suffer from this diet. At the end of
 eight days, one of the mice seemed very ill, and
 next day he found the sick mouse half-eaten by
 the other. The animals had eaten hemlock seed in
 quantities which would have been fatal to a man.

ARTS AND ALPINE VEGETATION.—A certain amount
 of success attends the comparison of the vegetation
 at given elevations, and at corresponding varia-
 tions in latitude; but the distribution of heat is
 very different under the two conditions. Upon a
 mountain top in France or Switzerland, they strike
 vigorously upon the soil, which they heat consid-
 erably, while, in such a neighbourhood as that of
 Spitzbergen, the dense air intercepts a great deal
 of solar heat. From these facts, it is not surprising
 that Mr. Charles Martin found 131 phanerogams on
 the terminal Faulhorn, while only 91 have been
 discovered in the whole archipelago of Spitzbergen.

GIGANTIC SHELLS.—The largest of all sea-shells
 are met with in the Pacific Ocean. Captain Cook,
 the great explorer, weighed the fish out of one of
 them, and it brought down the scale at twenty
 pounds. Nor did he shrink from trying how the
 shell monster tasted, and he declared that it made
 very good eating. Another traveller says that if a
 man were to be daring enough to put in his hand
 between these two bivalve shells, and if they closed
 upon him, he would not be able to draw it out
 again as long as the animal lived. In the Church
 of St. Sulpice, Paris, there are two of these shells,
 which are used as holy-water fountains, and these two
 shells weigh together five hundred pounds.

THE INSTINCT OF STELLA.—A little dog had lost
 an eye in a fight with a cat. This was a long time
 ago, so that now old age and infirmity had made
 Stella quite pacific. She had given up all idea of
 fighting, when one day hunting in the garden, she
 came, thinking no evil to the door of an outhouse
 where the cat was bringing up its kittens. Minette
 who saw an enemy in every dog, left her young,
 and came forward with her back arched. Stella,
 relying upon the purity of her intentions, did not
 run away. Minette mistook this calmness for in-
 solence, and jumped on the head of the dog. Then
 poor Stella, unable to defend herself, lay down on
 her back, and remembering that cats' claws are
 particularly dangerous to the eyes, held one of her
 paws over the remaining eye. She was found thus
 when her cries were heard, and she was saved from
 the teeth and claws of the furious Minette. She
 was covered with wounds, but had saved her eye.

SWALLOWS.—We may say that everybody is ac-
 quainted with the swallow—the varieties distinct
 in plumage and habits. There is the sand martin,
 who excavates his nest in a sand bank; the twitter-
 ing blue-birded swallow, who builds in our chim-
 ney; the house-martin, who builds in the upper
 angle of a window, or under the jutting roof; and
 the long-winged, active swift, known by their dark
 plumage, and their circling in calm evenings at a
 great height. They all live upon insects. The
 chimney-swallow is a perfect pattern of maternal af-
 fection; from morning till night, during the whole
 summer, she is continually skimming close to the
 ground, hunting for flies for her young brood.
 Bewick gives an amusing account of a swallow that
 became quite attached to the children by whom he
 was reared. They used to go out in the field to-
 gether, the bird being permitted to fly wherever he
 wished; but he kept always circling above them
 wherever they went. When one of the children
 caught a fly he called the swallow with a whistle,
 when it immediately descended and perched on
 the hand of the child who had the fly prepared for
 him.

SUN SPOTS AND FAMINE.—It has been surmised
 that some relation exists between sun spots and
 prevalent weather on the earth, and the theory
 has been proposed that periodic variations in climate
 bear some relation in recurrence to the cyclical
 periods in which the sun spots are most or least nume-
 rous. Dr. Hunter, official director-general of
 statistics, has recently directed the attention of the
 Government of India to this alleged connection
 between the periods of maxima and minima sun
 spots, and the amount of rainfall at corresponding
 times in the Madras Presidency, where a great
 famine is now prevailing. General Strachey, how-
 ever, in a recent communication read before the
 Royal Society, after a careful examination of the
 recorded rainfalls in Madras, Calcutta and Bombay
 for the past sixty-four years, comes to the conclusion
 that no real connection has been established be-
 tween rainfall and sun spots, and shows that even
 if such were apparently the case as regards Madras,
 the same would be true in Calcutta, and Bombay
 whereas the rain-falls of those localities show no
 such coincidence.

THE CAPTURE OF HYENAS.—The following mode of
 taming hyenas in their dens, as practised in Africa,
 is given by Arthur Conolly in his "Oryanland
 Journal." In the words of an Afghan chief, the Shir-
 azee Syed Daoud: "When you have tracked the beast
 to his den, you take trope with two slipknots upon
 it in your right hand, and with your left holding a
 felt cloak before you, you go boldly but quietly in.
 The animal does not know the nature of the danger
 and therefore retires to the back of the den, but you
 may always tell where his head is by the glare of
 his eyes. You keep moving gradually towards him
 on your knees, and when you are within distance
 throw the cloak over his head close with him, and
 take care he does not free himself. The beast is so
 frightened that he cowers back; and though he may
 bite the felt, he cannot turn his neck round to hurt
 you, so go quietly feel for his forelegs, slip the knot
 over them, and then with one strong pull draw them
 right up to the back of his neck and tie them there.
 The beast is now your own, and you can do what
 you like with him, as he is utterly powerless. We
 generally take those we catch home to the kraal,
 and then on the plain with bridles in their mouths,
 our dogs may be taught not to fear the brutes when
 they meet them wild." Hyenas are also taken alive
 by the Afghans by a very similar method, except that
 a wooden gag is used instead of a felt cloak. The
 similarity in the mode of capture in two such distant
 countries as Algeria and Afghanistan, and by two
 races so different, is remarkable. From the fact
 that the Afghans consider that the best method of
 presence of mind, and an instance being given of a
 man having died of a bite in a dummy attempt, we
 may infer that the Afghan hyena is more powerful
 or more ferocious than his African confrere.
