EARLY INDIAN MISSIONS OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN NEW YORK.

From the Gospel Messenger.

The following valuable and interesting extracts from the letter of a friend, (Mr. Clark, of Manlius Onondaga Co.) we are permitted to publish. They show the early intentions of the VENERABLE SOCIETY and the Sovereign of Great Britain towards a portion of the State occupied by this Diocese:

"In London Documents of 1700, p. 139-40, you will find that sometime previous to this date, King William ordered a Fort and Chapel to be built in the Onondaga county, and he also sent over 'Plate and Furniture' for the Chapel; but the design of building was abandoned upon the death of that monarch, (1703.) The Plate and Furniture I have been unable to trace. Upon the accession of Queen Anne, from motives of political expediency, the subject was renewed. The first report made to the Society Prop. Gen. For Parts, by the Rev. T. Moor, missionary, stated that there were 'great demands upon the Society for ministers, schools and libraries, for the Mohawks, for the Oneidas, one for the Onontagas, one for the Cayugas, one for the Sennekes."

"In 1702 four Iroquois Chiefs, who visited England, requested Her Majesty would take measures for the instruction of their people in the truths of Christianity. The matter was referred by the Archbishop of Canterbury to the Society P. G. F. Parts, who engaged to send out two missionaries. In 1710 a Chapel was erected at Fort Hunter, with a glebe of 300 acres of land. It was furnished with a bell, which is now used in the Academy at Johnstown. The Chapel was torn down in 1820 to make room for the Erie Canal. The parsonage still remains, or did a few years ago. Rev. Wm. Andrews came out as missionary in 1712, and after six years desired to be released, which was done. At the close of his report he says, 'There is no hope of making them better; heathen they are and heathen they still must be.'

"It appears that Queen Anne took no ordinary interest in the welfare of these people, and among the proofs of her beneficence she ordered a valuable Communion Service for each of the Five Nations, of 'pure and massive silver.' The set for the Mohawks was kept entire till 1786, when it was divided. Three pieces, one Chalice, one Paten, and one Flagon went with that portion of the nation, who under Thayendenega, settled at the Ottawa or Grand River, C. W., and two pieces, a Flagon and Paten, with that portion which settled at the Bay of Quinte under Capt. John Deserontyon. There are many beautiful remembrances, connected with this branch of the Mohawk Church.

"It seems that the good Queen Anne contemplated the erection of a Chapel at Onondaga, but I find no record or tradition of its accomplishment or of any labours of any missionary of the Church of England, nor of the Episcopal Church, earlier than Bishop Hobart's, 1816.

"Queen Anne died in 1714, and of course her care and patronage ceased; and George I. was not remarkable for his fostering care of the Indian Church in America."

From Boston, September 20th, we learn that another American poaching schooner, called *Caroline Knight*, of Newburyport, has been seized by a British cruiser, for a violation of the fishing treaty, and carried into Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. This poacher is a new vessel, and is valued at \$6,000.—Colonist.

The preparations for the Dumfries Agricultural Show in Galt, says the Reporter, proceed diligently and with marked success. All the Judges have been appointed, and have nearly all accepted their appointments—and they are men in whom the public have confidence. The whole preparations are in the hands of a committee of diligent and prudent men, who will be satisfied to do their utmost to make the Galt Show worthy of this great Agricultural and Mechanical country.

The extension Telegraph Line from Hamilton to Galt has been commenced. Last week the poles began to be laid at Rockton in the township of Beverly. The shares necessary for the completion of the undertaking have all been taken up.

Our harbour presented a fine appearance yesterday, there being five Schooners and two first class Steamers comfortably lying at the Quays. The *Process* was one of the steamers. Although she draws more water than any other on the lake, she was moored in the inner harbour in 12 feet clear. She will remain till some trifling damage done to

her Engine on her way from Kingston is repaired.—Cobourg Star.

LATEST PARLIAMENTARY SUMMARY BY TELEGRAPH.

QUEBEC, Sept. 28.

Last night after the report left, Mr. Dixon introduced a Bill to repeal the 13th & 14th Vict., chap. 23, and to make further provisions for protecting foreign Bills of Exchange.

Mr. Boulton moved an address to His Excellency for a statement relative to the Sinking Fund of the Province, and the Clergy Reserve, Grammar Schools, Indian and Jesuit Estates Fund, which was carried.

On motion of Mr. Merritt, the House went into Committee of the whole, for an Address to Her Majesty, to grant Medals to the survivors of the Canadian Militia of the War of 1812. He particularly called the attention of the Committee to the gallant conduct of Terrence, and contended that a monument should be erected on the spot where he fell. Mr. Merritt's motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Mackenzie's Bill for the Election of Sheriffs was lost on a vote of yeas 5, nays 42.

Mr. Laurin moved the second reading of a Bill to amend the Act for Summary Trials in small cases in Lower Canada.

Mr. Mackenzie's Bill to Record the Votes of Members of Parliament was ordered to be read this day six months. Year 21, nays 8.

Mr. Robinson moved the second reading of the Bill to incorporate the Sault St. Marine Canal, which after a discussion the Bill was ordered to be read this day six months on motion of Mr. Hincks. Yeas 28, nays 13.

Mr. Brown moved the second reading of the Bill to fix the time for the meeting of Parliament. He spoke at some length.

Mr. Morin opposed it as did also M. Hincks who said there was no use to press such a measure, as if the House would simply pass an address to His Excellency stating at what time they desired Parliament to meet it would be attended to.

Mr. Hincks advised the hon. member to withdraw his motion.
