QUEBEC-DEATHS ATTRIBUTED TO BEER DRINKING

MacEachen (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, the investigation is still continuing into what is alleged to be the relationship between the consumption of beer and an obscure heart disorder. At present the investigation has been unable to establish a direct relationship between the consumption of the suspected beer and the cases of heart failure which have been established. Other factors not yet identified may be involved in these cases, and under these circumstances I should not be justified in directly associating these cases with the consumption of beer, and I should certainly not be justified in naming the firm responsible for the production of the suspected beer until further investigation is completed.
