The Health Department is in control of communicable diseases, and they would, in that specific field, have to deal with the school child. So that, that would be the first point which I would question.

THE PRINCIPAL: Well, if the service is conducted by the Health Department. Once a member of the staff of the Health Department enters the schools to conduct, let us you finish, or, would it be more convenient to you, say, physical examinations, he is, in fact, there for if questions be asked as we proceed.

DEAN FLEMING: Yes, I think so. Equate school health services are conducted on both planes.

THE PRINCIPAL: On that score. The Public Health Service, or whatever the title is, is charged with this responsibility, so, would there not be a conflict of authority?

DEAN FLEMING: In what way? I am not quite sure what you mean.

THE PRINCIPAL: The ~~student~~ situation would be this.

The schools under control of the Protestant Committee - the public Health Service is an agency wholly independent.
