

GRAPE ARRIVALS MORE ABUNDANT

Prices Dropped to Twenty-Five Cents for Large Basket.

MELON MARKET WEAK

Plums and Pears Become Scarcer - Onions Cheaper.

Cantaloupes were very plentiful on the market Saturday, and were difficult to dispose of, as the supply exceeded the demand.

Onions are slightly cheaper, selling at 11 1/2c per 15-lb. sack.

Summer squash—80c per 11-quart basket. Tomatoes—Eleven-quart flats, 10c to 20c; 11-quart lemons, 25c.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Again the market was filled to overflowing, a number of wagons having to line up on West Market street. It is not that the garage was removed?

Caullage, the predominating vegetable on Saturday, which they have previously been so scarce and of such poor quality that everyone seemed eager to have some, especially as they were of such good quality and sold at 10c to 20c per head.

Rowett, Humber Bay, had 360 heads of caullage, and the majority of them were especially good.

D. Pycoc, Humber Bay, had about 204 heads of good quality.

Oscar Baker, Stouffville, had a large quantity of especially good ones.

C. W. Stover, Markham, also had some heads of good quality.

Corn was also plentiful, but a large quantity of it was rather old.

Geo. Ewers, Fairbank, had some especially good, especially as they were of such good quality and sold at 10c to 20c per head.

W. Harrison, Downsview, also had some first-class evergreen.

Apples were especially plentiful, and the quality is getting better all the time.

Saturday they sold at 9c to \$1 per bushel, and 9c to 40c per basket.

J. Schall, Ringwood, had some hand-picked, good quality barrels.

Butter was slightly easier in price on Saturday, as there was a larger quantity coming in from the market than has been brought on for some time.

It started at 25c per lb., but gradually weakened, closing at 20c per lb., the bulk going at 22c to 25c per dozen.

Eggs kept firm in price, selling at 20c to 25c per dozen, some going as low as 15c, but the bulk sold at 22c to 25c per dozen.

The chickens as a whole were of much better quality, but that would not be difficult, as those which have been coming in have been very poor. There is still room for improvement.

On Saturday they sold at 18c to 22c per lb. and 25c per lb.

Mrs. Geo. Gray, Brampton, had 75 lbs. of caullage, and 27 dozen of eggs.

There were four loads of hay brought in on Saturday, selling at \$18 to \$23 per ton, and a large quantity of oats, which sold at 50c to 60c per bushel.

WHEAT GOT ABOVE EXPORT LEVELS

High Price at Winnipeg Not Met by Overseas Buyers at Montreal.

Canadian Press Despatch. CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Broadening European demand carried wheat prices up Saturday with a rush. The extreme advance was 2 3/8c, but not all of the gain was held and the market closed unsettled 1 3/4c to 2c above last night.

Foreigners taking wheat and flour faster than supplies could be readily obtained from farmers and mills was the way the trade situation was described by one usually well advanced authority.

The radical bulls, however, were surprised by the downward movement in the December price of Liverpool over night. It was explained that stocks there were falling off and that calls from other trans-Atlantic countries had widened to a notable extent.

Offerings of wheat here were very limited until the market has reached the level for the previous week. Reaction followed, but soon the upward sweep was on again. Afterward there was considerable week-end realizing.

Seaboard demand for oats continued strong. Offers by cable to Baltimore were said to be the highest of the year. Buying of lard on the part of houses with European connections was a feature in provisions. Meat sales were slow.

WATER COMPANY DEAL AT MONTREAL FIASCO. Aldermen Reject Proposal of Mayor and Two Controllers by Huge Majority.

Canadian Press Despatch. MONTREAL, Sept. 20.—By a vote of 21 to 1 the city council at a special meeting on Saturday rejected the recommendation of Mayor Martin and Controllers Hebert and Cote to purchase the plant of the Montreal Water and Power Company at \$3,000,000.

The only alderman opposing the council vote was Ald. Troop.

LABORER DROWNED AT PORT WELLER

Another Man Injured in Dumping Accident at New Breakwater.

ST. CATHARINES, Sept. 20.—A car of excavated earth from No. 3 section Welland Ship Canal, removed by Baldrick & Hutchinson, contractors, was being dumped at the breakwater which is being constructed at Port Weller Saturday when Michael Horovitch was knocked into the lake and drowned and Andrew Muskiy was partially buried alive and is now in the construction hospital badly injured. Both men were Russians. The body of the drowned man has not been recovered.
