MASSY-HARRIS APPEAL.

An appeal is being made before the court of revision by the Massey-Harris Company for a reduction in the assessment of a portion of their property on King street west containing in all 4.8 acres. On a portion of 2.8 acres the assessment on the land for 1915 is \$88,150, and on the business valuation \$56,800, a total of \$144,950. In a letter to the court the vice-president of the company points out that from 1909 to 1915 there was an increase in the assessment of 136 per cent, and 200 per cent in taxes, while during the same period the business only increased 32 per cent.
