FARMERS HARVEST CORN

Garnered Without Any Very Serious Damage.

Two weeks of ideal weather for the ingathering of the corn and root crops has given the farmers in central Ontario a fine chance to harvest the long delayed fodder corn before it was seriously injured, tho early in the season the mangold, carrot and potato crop was pretty well stored away in the silos and cellars. If fine weather continues the turnip crop, which is very backward and only an average yield, will be left togrow for another fortnight.

The potato crop is said to be the poorest in 25 years, scores of farmers not taking the time to gather them. The

not taking the time to gather them. The price has already soared to \$1.30 a bag, with a few good ones coming in, and recourse has been had to the crop of New Brunswick Delawares, which are retailing over the city from \$1.40 to \$1.50 a bag.

Apples are scarce and high in price, many of the fruit growers in Durham, Northumberland and Peterboro Counties being without any Northern Spies. Other winter varieties are far below an average yield. Fall work is going on apace and the greatly delayed, probably 25 or 30 per cent. of the land has been turned over.
