from California or Puget Sound ports. Special medical officers have been stationed at the various points where railways enter British Columbia from the United States, with instructions to specially examine for the bubonic plague. On the report of the news of the outbreak at Seattle, the Director-General of Public Health was at once sent there and to British Columbia to supervise the precautionary measures being taken. While at Seattle, that officer was able to secure, by the courtesy of the United States Public Health authorities, that an arrangement should be made by them with the various railway companies running out of Seattle, that empty freight cars should be sprinkled with chloride of lime or carbolic acid, and that their doors should be kept closed, especially when at a station platform and always at night, to prevent so far as possible the entry of rats into the cars. A supply of Yersin's anti-plague serum was sent to the different quarantine officers, maritime and inland, in British Columbia, and will be renewed from time to time. Haffkine's plague prophylactic fluid is prepared in our quarantine laboratory, and has been placed in the hands of our medical officers in British Columbia.
